PREFACE TO THE ORDINATION RITES

The Holy Scriptures and ancient Christian writers make it clear that from the apostles' time, there have been different ministries within the Church. In particular, since the time of the New Testament, three distinct orders of ordained ministers have been characteristic of Christ's holy Catholic Church. First, there is the order of bishops who carry on the apostolic work of leading, supervising, and uniting the Church. Secondly, associated with them are the presbyters, or ordained elders, in subsequent times generally known as priests. Together with the bishops, they take part in the governance of the Church, in the carrying out of its missionary and pastoral work, and in the preaching of the Word of God and administering his holy Sacraments. Thirdly, there are deacons who assist bishops and priests in all of this work. It is also a special responsibility of deacons to minister in Christ's name to the poor, the sick, the suffering, and the helpless.

The persons who are chosen and recognized by the Church as being called by God to the ordained ministry are admitted to these sacred orders by solemn prayer and the laying on of episcopal hands. It has been, and is, the intention and purpose of this Church to maintain and continue these three orders; and for this purpose these services of ordination and consecration are appointed. No persons are allowed to exercise the offices of bishop, priest, or deacon in this Church unless they are so ordained, or have already received such ordination with the laying on of hands by bishops who are themselves duly qualified to confer Holy Orders.

It is also recognized and affirmed that the threefold ministry is not the exclusive property of this portion of Christ's catholic Church, but is a gift from God for the nurture of his people and the proclamation of his Gospel everywhere. Accordingly, the manner of ordaining in this Church is to be such as has been, and is, most generally recognized by Christian people as suitable for the conferring of the sacred orders of bishop, priest, and deacon.

WHAT IS THE MINISTRY OF A BISHOP?

The ministry of a bishop is to represent Christ and his Church, particularly as apostle, chief priest, and pastor of a diocese; to guard the faith, unity, and discipline of the whole Church; to proclaim the Word of God; to act in Christ's name for the reconciliation of the world and the building up of the Church; and to ordain others to continue Christ's ministry.

THE ORDINATION AND CONSECRATION OF A BISHOP

Throughout this liturgy we will sit, many of us will stand, some of us will kneel, the Bishop Coadjutor-elect will be prostrate (an ancient posture of submission practiced among Christians, Jews, and Muslims) — all of which use the whole body. Others among us, the security officers, for example, will pray vigilantly by tending to our safety. We will use our voices to sing, and our ears to listen; silence will be ample, as will the volume of brass, timpani, and organ. The beauty and smell of flowers and the feeling of water on our heads will point us towards God. This liturgy is enriched by the participation of everyone in the room. All are invited to speak the bolded text aloud. Some people choose to manifest prayers in physical ways to center their hearts and minds on God's presence in their lives and in the liturgy — we call these actions "manual acts." There are several points during the liturgy, where many people cross themselves by touching their head, chest, and each shoulder (left then right) to remind themselves that God is in their head, heart, and in all of their actions in the world. Moments where this commonly occurs are indicated by the **Symbol*. It might be helpful to remember that hundreds of people will watch this liturgy in parish halls, or in kitchens, or on airplanes. The Transition Committee encourages all of us to remember that no matter where we gather to worship, or what postures we take, we give glory to the God who created us.





THE THANKSGIVING OVER THE WATER

The water used at today's service comes from each Mission Area.

The Presiding Bishop says:

The Lord be with you.

People And also with you.

Presiding Bishop Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

People It is right to give our thanks and praise.

The Presiding Bishop continues as Deacons pour water into the font:

We thank you, Almighty God, for the gift of water. Over it the Holy Spirit moved in the beginning of creation. Through it you led the children of Israel out of their bondage in Egypt into the land of promise. In it your Son Jesus received the baptism of John and was anointed by the Holy Spirit as the Messiah, the Christ, to lead us, through his death and resurrection, from the bondage of sin into everlasting life.

We thank you, Father, for the water of Baptism. In it we are buried with Christ in his death. By it we share in his resurrection. Through it we are reborn by the Holy Spirit. Therefore in joyful obedience to your Son, we bring into his fellowship those who come to him in faith, baptizing them in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

Now sanctify this water, we pray you, by the power of your Holy Spirit, that those who here are cleansed from sin and born again may continue for ever in the risen life of Jesus Christ our Savior.

To him, to you, and to the Holy Spirit, be all honor and glory, now and for ever. Amen.



The bishops and people remain standing. The Presiding Bishop says:

Alleluia. Christ is risen.

People Christ is risen indeed. Alleluia.

THE COLLECT FOR PURITY

Almighty God, to you all hearts are open, all desires known, and from you no secrets are hid. Cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy Name; through Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

THE PRESENTATION

The bishops and people sit. Representatives of the diocese, both priests and lay persons, standing before the Presiding Bishop, present the Bishop Coadjutor-elect, saying:

Michael, Bishop in the Church of God, the clergy and people of the Diocese of Ohio, trusting in the guidance of the Holy Spirit, have chosen Anne Bryson Jolly to be a bishop and chief pastor. We therefore ask you to lay your hands upon her and in the power of the Holy Spirit to consecrate her a bishop in the one, holy, catholic, and apostolic Church.

The Presiding Bishop then directs that the testimonials of the election be read.

THE TESTIMONIALS AND DECLARATION

The Certificate of Election, the document from the 206th Annual Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Ohio that declares that the Reverend Anne Jolly was duly elected as Bishop Coadjutor of the Episcopal Diocese of Ohio, is read by Ms. Darcel Arrington of St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in Cleveland, Ohio, Secretary of the Diocese.

The Canonical Testimonial, which asserts that the election was done according to the proper canonical procedures, is read by The Reverend Chris McCann of St. Luke's Episcopal Church in Chardon, Ohio, Chair of the Commission on Ministry.

The Evidence of Ordination to the Diaconate and Priesthood, furnished by the Church Pension Group, indicates that the Bishop Coadjutor-elect was duly ordained to the Diaconate and Priesthood in the apostolic succession, a necessity for her consecration. It is read by Ms. Halley Marsh of St. Barnabas Episcopal Church in Bay Village, Ohio, Chair of the Bishop Coadjutor Search Committee.

The Consents of the Standing Committees, furnished by the Secretary of the House of Deputies, The Reverend Canon Michael Barlowe, indicates that the Bishop Coadjutor-elect has received consents to her election from two-thirds of the Standing Committees of the dioceses of The Episcopal Church. It is read by Ms. Pam O'Halloran of St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Cleveland Heights, Ohio, President of the Standing Committee.

The Consents of the Bishops, furnished by the Office of the Presiding Bishop, indicates that the Bishop Coadjutor-elect has received consents to her election from two-thirds of the Bishops with jurisdiction of The Episcopal Church. It is read by The Right Reverend Matthew Gunter, Bishop of Fond du Lac, Provisional Bishop of Eau Claire, and President of Province V of the Episcopal Church.

When the reading of the testimonials is ended, the Presiding Bishop requires the following promise from the Bishop Coadjutor-elect:

In the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, I, Anne Bryson Jolly, chosen Bishop of the Church in Ohio, solemnly declare that I do believe the Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments to be the Word of God, and to contain all things necessary to salvation; and I do solemnly engage to conform to the doctrine, discipline, and worship of the Episcopal Church.

The Bishop Coadjutor-elect then signs the above Declaration in the sight of all present. The witnesses add their signatures.

The people stand as able or take a posture of praise.

The Presiding Bishop then says the following, or similar words, and asks the response of the people:

Brothers and sisters in Christ Jesus, you have heard testimony given that Anne Bryson Jolly has been duly and lawfully elected to be a bishop of the Church of God to serve in the Diocese of Ohio. You have been assured of her suitability and that the Church has approved her for this sacred responsibility. Nevertheless, if any of you know any reason why we should not proceed, let it now be made known.

If no objection is made, the Presiding Bishop continues

Presiding Bishop Is it your will that we ordain Anne a bishop?

People That is our will.

Presiding Bishop Will you uphold Anne as bishop?

People We will.


The Presiding Bishop then says

The Scriptures tell us that our Savior Christ spent the whole night in prayer before he chose and sent forth his twelve apostles. Likewise, the apostles prayed before they appointed Matthias to be one of their number. Let us, therefore, follow their examples, and offer our prayers to Almighty God before we ordain Anne for the work to which we trust the Holy Spirit has called her.

All remain standing, or take a posture of prayer, except the Bishop Coadjutor-elect, who is prostrate in front of the Altar.

THE EXAMINATION

All now sit, except the Bishop Coadjutor-elect, who stands facing the bishops. The Presiding Bishop addresses the Bishop Coadjutor-elect:

My sister, the people have chosen you and have affirmed their trust in you by acclaiming your election. A bishop in God's holy Church is called to be one with the apostles in proclaiming Christ's resurrection and interpreting the Gospel, and to testify to Christ's sovereignty as Lord of lords and King of kings.

You are called to guard the faith, unity, and discipline of the Church; to celebrate and to provide for the administration of the sacraments of the New Covenant; to ordain priests and deacons and to join in ordaining bishops; and to be in all things a faithful pastor and wholesome example for the entire flock of Christ.

With your fellow bishops you will share in the leadership of the Church throughout the world. Your heritage is the faith of patriarchs, prophets, apostles, and martyrs, and those of every generation who have looked to God in hope. Your joy will be to follow him who came, not to be served, but to serve, and to give his life a ransom for many.

Are you persuaded that God has called you to the office of bishop?

Answer I am so persuaded.

The following questions are then addressed to the Bishop Coadjutor-elect by one or more of the other bishops:

Bishop Will you accept this call and fulfill this trust in obedience to Christ?

Answer I will obey Christ, and will serve in his name.

Bishop Will you be faithful in prayer, and in the study of Holy Scripture, that you may have the mind of

Christ?

Answer I will, for he is my help.

Bishop Will you boldly proclaim and interpret the Gospel of Christ, enlightening the minds and stirring

up the conscience of your people?

Answer I will, in the power of the Spirit.

Bishop As a chief priest and pastor, will you encourage and support all baptized people in their gifts and

ministries, nourish them from the riches of God's grace, pray for them without ceasing, and

celebrate with them the sacraments of our redemption?

Answer I will, in the name of Christ, the Shepherd and Bishop of our souls.

Bishop Will you guard the faith, unity, and discipline of the Church?

Answer I will, for the love of God.

Bishop Will you share with your fellow bishops in the government of the whole Church; will you sustain

your fellow presbyters and take counsel with them; will you guide and strengthen the deacons

and all others who minister in the Church?

Answer I will, by the grace given me.

Bishop Will you be merciful to all, show compassion to the poor and strangers, and defend those who

have no helper?

Answer I will, for the sake of Christ Jesus.

All stand or take a posture of prayer. The Presiding Bishop then says:

Anne, through these promises you have committed yourself to God, to serve his Church in the office of bishop. We therefore call upon you, chosen to be a guardian of the Church's faith, to lead us in confessing that faith.

Bishop Coadjutor-elect We believe in one God.

All We believe in one God,

the Father, the Almighty,

maker of heaven and earth,

of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ,

the only Son of God,

eternally begotten of the Father,

God from God, Light from Light,

true God from true God,

begotten, not made,

of one Being with the Father.

Through him all things were made.

For us and for our salvation

he came down from heaven:

by the power of the Holy Spirit

he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary,

and was made man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate;

he suffered death and was buried.

On the third day he rose again

in accordance with the Scriptures;

he ascended into heaven

and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead,

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.



THE CONSECRATION OF THE BISHOP

All continue to stand, or take a posture of prayer, except the Bishop Coadjutor-elect, who kneels before the Presiding Bishop. The other bishops stand to the right and left of the Presiding Bishop. All sing:



A period of silent prayer follows, the people still standing.

The Presiding Bishop then begins this Prayer of Consecration:

God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, Father of mercies and God of all comfort, dwelling on high but having regard for the lowly, knowing all things before they come to pass: We give you thanks that from the beginning you have gathered and prepared a people to be heirs of the covenant of Abraham, and have raised up prophets, kings, and priests, never leaving your temple untended. We praise you also that from the creation you have graciously accepted the ministry of those whom you have chosen.

The Presiding Bishop and other bishops now lay their hands upon the head of the Bishop Coadjutor-elect, and say together:

Therefore, Father, make Anne a bishop in your Church. Pour out upon her the power of your princely Spirit, whom you bestowed upon your beloved Son Jesus Christ, with whom he endowed the apostles, and by whom your Church is built up in every place, to the glory and unceasing praise of your Name.

The Presiding Bishop continues:

To you, O Father, all hearts are open; fill, we pray, the heart of this your servant whom you have chosen to be a bishop in your Church, with such love of you and of all the people, that she may feed and tend the flock of Christ, and exercise without reproach the high priesthood to which you have called her, serving before you day and night in the ministry of reconciliation, declaring pardon in your Name, offering the holy gifts, and wisely overseeing the life and work of the Church. In all things may she present before you the acceptable offering of a pure, and gentle, and holy life; through Jesus Christ your Son, to whom, with you and the Holy Spirit, be honor and power and glory in the Church, now and for ever.

The People in a loud voice respond:

Amen.

The new Bishop is now vested according to the order of bishops. After this, other symbols of office are presented.

A Crozier is presented by the current and former Bishops of Ohio with these words:

As you begin your ministry with the people of the Diocese of Ohio, we give into your hands this pastoral staff. May Christ the good Shepherd uphold you and sustain you as you carry it in his name. **Amen.**

A Bible is presented by the Presiding Bishop with these words:

Receive the Holy Scriptures. Feed the flock of Christ committed to your charge, guard and defend them in his truth, and be a faithful steward of his holy Word and Sacraments.

The Presiding Bishop presents to the people their new Bishop. The clergy and people offer their acclamation and applause.

THE PEACE

The new Bishop then says

The peace of the Lord be always with you.

People And also with you.

The Presiding Bishop and other Bishops greet the new Bishop. The people greet one another. The new Bishop also greets members of the clergy, family members, and the congregation.

The new Bishop officially greets the Presiding Bishop and offers words of thanks. The Minister of Ceremonies gives instructions about the administration of Holy Communion; the new Bishop then says an offertory sentence.

Then the new Bishop goes to the Altar as chief Celebrant and, joined by other bishops and presbyters, proceeds with the celebration of the Eucharist. The people remain standing or in a posture of praise as the Celebrant faces them and says:

The Lord be with you.

People And also with you.


Bishop Lift up your hearts.

People We lift them to the Lord.

Bishop Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.
People It is right to give our thanks and praise.

Then, facing the Altar, the Bishop proceeds:

It is right, and a good and joyful thing, always and everywhere to give thanks to you, Almighty God, Creator of heaven and earth. Through the great shepherd of your flock, Jesus Christ our Lord; who after the resurrection sent forth the apostles to preach the Gospel and to teach all nations; and promised to be with them always, even to the end of the ages. Therefore we praise you, joining our voices with Angels and Archangels and with all the company of heaven, who for ever sing this hymn to proclaim the glory of your Name:



We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in Jesus Christ, the Word made flesh. For in these last days you sent Jesus to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In Christ, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In Christ, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

At the following words concerning the bread, the Bishop is to hold it, or lay a hand upon it, and at the words concerning the cup, to hold or place a hand upon the cup and any other vessel containing wine to be consecrated.

On the night before he died for us, our Savior Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper, Jesus took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore, according to his command, O Father,

We remember Christ's death, we proclaim Christ's resurrection, we await Christ's coming in glory.

The Bishop continues

And we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, O Savior of all; presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine.

We pray you, gracious God, to send your Holy Spirit upon these gifts that they may be the Sacrament of the Body of Christ and his Blood of the new Covenant. Unite us in the sacrifice of Jesus Christ, through whom we are acceptable to you, being A sanctified by the Holy Spirit. In the fullness of time, put all things in subjection under your Christ, and bring us to that heavenly country where, with the ever-Blessed Virgin Mary, Blessed Catherine, and all your saints, we may enter the everlasting heritage of your children; through Jesus Christ our Savior, the firstborn of all creation, the head of the Church, and the author of our salvation.



LITURGICAL NOTES AND COMMENTARY

ABOUT THE CHIEF CONSECRATOR AND PREACHER

The Most Reverend Michael Bruce Curry is presiding bishop and primate of The Episcopal Church. At the church's 78th General Convention in June 2015, he was elected to a nine-year term in this role and installed in November of that year; he serves as The Episcopal Church's chief pastor, spokesperson, and president and chief executive officer.

Throughout his ministry, Bishop Curry has been a prophetic leader, particularly in the areas of racial reconciliation, climate change, evangelism, immigration policy, and marriage equality. His vision and message as presiding bishop is animated by Jesus of Nazareth and his way of radical, sacrificial love, and he regularly reminds Episcopalians they are "the Episcopal branch of the Jesus Movement."

Widely regarded as one of the most dynamic preachers of our time, Bishop Curry was ordained a priest in 1978 and served parishes in North Carolina, Ohio, and Maryland until his election as the 11th bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of North Carolina in 2000.

Bishop Curry has been extensively involved in Crisis Control Ministry and the Absalom Jones Initiative, founding ecumenical summer day camps for children, preaching missions, creating networks of family day care providers and educational centers, and brokering millions of dollars of investment in urban neighborhoods.

The descendant of enslaved Africans brought to North America by way of the trans-Atlantic slave routes, Bishop Curry was born in Chicago in 1953. His father was also an Episcopal priest, and after Bishop Curry's mother died when he was young, he and his sister were raised by their father and grandmother in upstate New York.

Bishop Curry attended public schools in Buffalo, graduated with high honors from Hobart and William Smith Colleges, and earned a Master of Divinity degree from Yale Divinity School. He furthered his education at The College of Preachers, Princeton Theological Seminary, Wake Forest University, the Ecumenical Institute at St. Mary's Seminary, and the Institute of Christian Jewish Studies. He holds honorary doctorates from Yale University, Virginia Theological Seminary, Hobart and William Smith Colleges, and Episcopal Divinity School.

Bishop Curry is the author of five books and a regular guest on national and international media outlets. In 2018, Religion News Association named him religion newsmaker of the year.

A resident of Raleigh, North Carolina, Bishop Curry is married to Sharon (Clement) Curry, and the couple has two adult daughters, Rachel and Elizabeth.

All gifts were blessed at the rehearsal dinner last night, and those not presented in the context of today's service were presented at the same gathering.

ABOUT THE HYMNODY

The first hymn in procession, *Praise to the Lord, the Almighty*, is primarily based on Psalms 103 and 150, but pulls imagery from across the Psalter. Written in German by Joachim Neander, a 17th century Reformed hymnist, the 44

translation used today is based off of the *Hymnal 1940*. The tune, *Lobe den Herren*, comes from the 17th century hymnal *Emeurten Gesangbunch*, and was altered by Neander to fit the text. Part of today's arrangement is by Mack Wilberg, music director of the Choir at Temple Square, written for that choir.

The second hymn in procession, *God is love*, was written by the 20th-century cleric Timothy Rees. A Welshman, Rees pursued a monastic vocation with the Community of the Resurrection, where he served as Principal of their theological college in Yorkshire. Appointed Bishop of Llandaff (Cardiff), his prolific hymnwriting led to two different texts being placed in the *Hymnal 1982*. *Abbot's Leigh* was composed by Cyril Taylor, an employee of the British Broadcasting Company (BBC), as a replacement for the hymn-tune *Austria* during the second World War as the latter was the tune for the German National Anthem, the Deutschlandlied. Taylor named his hymn after the village he composed it in near Bristol, which was the BBC's wartime headquarters.

The final hymn in procession, *St. Patrick's Breastplate*, is attributed to the eponymous Saint Patrick of Ireland. The *Liber Hymnorium*, an 11th century book of Irish hymns, gives an account of Patrick's usage of the prayer: "Saint Patrick sang this when an ambush was laid against his coming by Loegaire, that he might not go to Tara to sow the faith. And then it appeared before those lying in ambush that they (Saint Patrick and his monks) were wild deer with a fawn following them." The Irish hymnwriter Cecil Frances Alexander wrote the text used today in 1889 at the request of H. H. Dickinson, Dean of the Chapel Royal in Ireland. Charles Villiers Stanford, an Anglo-Irish composer, arranged the music in 1902 using two traditional Irish tunes – *St. Patrick* and *Gartan*.

Disparate accounts are told of the origin of *I have decided to follow Jesus*, but they all agree that the person who wrote it faced some sort of persecution as a faithful Christian in northeastern India. The text alludes to one of the Presiding Bishop's favorite Bible verses – "No one who puts a hand to the plow and looks back is fit for the kingdom of God." The tune, *Assam*, named after the region in northeastern India where the song might have originated from, is an Indian folk song, most likely from the Garo people.

Be thou my vision, a favorite hymn of the Bishop Coadjutor-elect's, is used for the Gospel procession. Another Irish hymn, a monk named Dallan Forgaill wrote a poem commemorating King Logaire of Tara sparing Saint Patrick for his blasphemy against the pagan gods of the time. In the 20th century, Mary Elizabeth Byrne translated the poem into English, and Eleanor Hull set the text into verses. The tune, *Slane*, is an Irish folk song that was chosen for the hymn text in 1927 by David Evans for the *Church Hymnary* of the Church of Scotland. The tune name reflects the location at which Saint Patrick was said to have defied the King.

Solemn notes of tribute sounded was written in 2017 for the Commemoration of Benefactors service at St. Catharine's College, Cambridge, by the Reverend Ally Barrett, their Chaplain, with the second verse written for today's service. It has been set to music for today by the organist and composer Sarah MacDonald, who is Fellow and Director of Music at Selwyn College, Cambridge and Director of Girl Choristers at Ely Cathedral. MacDonald was commissioned for this task by the clergy and people of Trinity Cathedral as a gift to the whole diocese.

The setting of *Veni Sancte Spiritus* used before the laying on of hands comes from the Taizé Community in France, an ecumenical monastic order in Burgundy, France. Known for their welcome to young people from across the world and a chant-based musical style, this and many of their best known chants were written by Jacques Berthier, a French composer affiliated with the Community. This ostinato-based chant, based on the Pentecost Sequence, repeats with occasional verses superimposed over the chant.

Perhaps one of the most well-known pieces of classical music, Ludwig van Beethoven's *Hymn to Joy*, the finale of his Ninth Symphony, was adapted for congregational singing by Edward Hodges for the Trinity Collection of Church Music in 1864, where it was set to two different texts – one by Robert Seagrave and one by Charles Wesley. It is Henry Van Dyke's text, however, that is eternally paired to this tune, with Van Dyke successfully capturing the joy found in the original ode written by Friedrich Schiller, which is decidedly secular in tone. Van Dyke, a Presbyterian,

was a professor of English at Princeton University and served as Ambassador to the Netherlands and Luxembourg. *Down in the River to Pray* was first printed in 1867's *Slave Songs of the United States*, a collection of African American music, and, like all folk music, experienced multiple metamorphoses into the version commonly known today. Best recognized for Alison Krauss's recording in the 2000 film *O Brother, Where Art Thou?*, multiple lines in the hymn are allusions to escaping slavery and traversing to freedom on the Underground Railroad all the way up to Station Hope here in Cleveland. Today's singing of this hymn will be led by Ms. Kathryn Duncan, Music and Engagement Minister at St. Gregory's Episcopal Church in Deerfield, Illinois.

Humbly I Adore Thee is one hymn from a set written for the feast of Corpus Christi by St. Thomas Aquinas around 1260 alongside Now my tongue the mystery telling and others. Set to a plainsong chant, it was translated into English by John Mason Neale, who wrote that "it is worthy of notice how the Angelic Doctor, as if afraid to employ any pomp of words on approaching so tremendous a Mystery, has used the very simplest expressions throughout."

The Protestant Reformation encouraged its adherents to sing "psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs" to God. A common creation was metrical psalters – setting the psalms to common poetic meters fit for singing. The most well-known of these psalters was the *Genevan Psalter*, with text in French and music by a variety of composers. Loys Bourgeois, a Genevan music teacher, edited the Psalter and wrote the tune for the 100th Psalm that we sing today.

All people that on earth do dwell, a metrical version of the 100th Psalm in English, was written by William Kethe, a man of whom we know very little, other than that he was exiled to the European continent during the time Bourgeois was editing the Genevan Psalter. The arrangement used today was first written by Ralph Vaughan Williams as a piece for choir and orchestra in 1930, which he adapted in 1953 for congregational use at the Coronation of Queen Elizabeth II.

Often called the "Black national anthem," *Lift Every Voice and Sing* was written by James Weldon Johnson, a civil rights activist, in 1900, as an attempt to commemorate Abraham Lincoln's birthday. Instead, Johnson chose to focus on the struggles of African Americans in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. His brother, J. Rosamond Johnson, a composer of the Harlem Renaissance era, wrote the music for the hymn in 1905. The hymn's status as the "Black national anthem" was the result of support from the NAACP, for whom James worked in the 1920s. Today's brass arrangement was written by Daniel Fortune, Director of Music at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Akron, for the ordination and consecration of Eugene Taylor Sutton as the fourteenth bishop of Maryland in June 2008.

The classic Anglican hymn *Alleluia! Sing to Jesus!* serves as the closing hymn for the service. Written by William C. Dix in 1866 for a service on Ascension Day, it is commonly sung to the Welsh tune *Hyfrydol* (meaning 'joyful'), which was composed by Rowland H. Prichard at the age of 19. They were first paired together in the 1906 edition of the *English Hymnal*, and the text has been in every hymnal of the Episcopal Church since 1892.

About the Anthems and Service Music

The Litany for Ordinations is a creation of the 1979 *Book of Common Prayer*, drawing from other sources in the prayer book tradition – Form V of the Prayers of the People, the Great Litany, the prayers for mission in Morning Prayer, and the 1928 Litany for Ordinations. The setting used at this service is by Robbe Delcamp, former University Organist and Choirmaster at the University of the South, where it was in use at All Saints' Chapel for the Great Litany. Arranged for the appropriate responses for today's service, this setting includes four-part harmony on the responses, and draws a connection to the Bishop-elect's seminary.

The portion of Psalm 36 selected for the commemoration of Catherine of Siena is sung to an Irish melody by Michael McGlynn, Composer-in-Residence and Artistic Director of ANÚNA, Ireland's National Choir. The setting uses a form of singing called heterophony, a technique still practiced today in the Western Isles of Scotland.

The *Te Deum* is a hymn of praise that dates back to the 4th century, traditionally ascribed to either Saint Ambrose or Saint Augustine. Traditionally sung as a canticle at Morning Prayer in the Anglican tradition, many composers have set it to music as part of a set of Morning Canticles with the *Jubilate Deo*. This setting, by Charles Villiers Stanford, an Anglo-Irish composer who was a founding professor at the Royal College of Music, is one part of his services in B-flat major, which he composed in 1879 as organist of Trinity College, Cambridge. Writer Robert Hugill notes, "The service is a major milestone in the development of Anglican church music, representing the harnessing of Brahmsian symphonic technique to the needs of the Anglican liturgy." The *Te Deum* is augmented with brass and timpani parts written by Richard Shepherd, a composer who served as Headmaster of York Minster School and as Chamberlain, and later Director of Development, at York Minster. This augmentation also offers a Chicago connection for the bishop coadjutor-elect, as her former clerical colleague there, the Very Reverend Dominic Barrington, was installed as Dean of York Minster in 2022.

The Call of Wisdom, by Will Todd, was commissioned in 2012 by the Dean and Chapter of St. Paul's Cathedral in London for the Diamond Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth II with generous sponsorship by the Worshipful Company of Horners. The text, by Canon Michael Hampel, at the time Precentor of the Cathedral, is based on the eighth chapter of the Book of Proverbs. Todd, a composer who primarily works on operas, wrote this piece for upper voices and it was premiered at a service celebrating the Diamond Jubilee in 2012 at St. Paul's Cathedral.

Elaine Hagenberg's *O Love* uses a text by the Scottish minister George Mathison. Blinded at 19 years old, his then-fiancée left him, and that pain inspired him two decades later on the eve of his sister's marriage to reflect on that experience. He wrote that he was "quite sure that the whole work was completed in five minutes, and equally sure that it never received at my hands any retouching or correction. I have no natural gift of rhythm. All the other verses I have ever written are manufactured articles; this came like a dayspring from on high." Hagenberg, upon reading the text, had a similar experience with the music coming to her.


ABOUT THE LITURGICAL TEXTS

Today's liturgy is taken from the *Book of Common Prayer*, which was composed from the ordinal of 1550, which was based on early ordination rites dating to the year 215. The readings for today come from those selected for the commemoration of Catherine of Siena in *Holy Women*, *Holy Men* and *Lesser Feasts and Fasts*.

ABOUT THE FURNISHINGS

The furnishings used at today's service come from parishes across the Diocese. The Altar comes from St. John's Episcopal Church in the Ohio City neighborhood of Cleveland, the Font comes from St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Cleveland Heights, and the Presiding Bishop's throne comes from St. Timothy's in Massillon. The chalices, patens, and linens are from Trinity Cathedral in Cleveland. Other furnishings come from Christ Church in Oberlin, Church of the Epiphany in Euclid, Grace Church in Willoughby, St. James in Boardman, St. Mark's in Shelby, St. Paul's in Akron, St. Mark's in Canton, St. Peter's in Lakewood, and Trinity in Toledo. Today's floral arrangements were made by the Flower Guild of Trinity Cathedral.
