Proceedings of the 202nd Convention November 10, 2018

At 9:00 a.m. on Saturday, November 10, 2018, Bishop Hollingsworth called the 202nd Annual Convention to order. He called upon Ms. Deborah Shamlin (St. Paul's, Canton), President of the Standing Committee, to lead opening prayers.

Bishop Hollingsworth appointed the Reverend Gay C. Jennings (St. Timothy's, Macedonia) to serve as Parliamentarian.

Bishop Hollingsworth called upon the Secretary of the Convention, Ms. Darcel Arrington, to report on the quorum. Ms. Arrington reported a quorum in both orders.

Bishop Hollingsworth thanked Ms. Arrington for her work as Secretary and the Rev. Jennings, the President of the House of Deputies, for her work as Parliamentarian.

Bishop Hollingsworth then introduced Mr. William Powel, Canon to the Ordinary. Bishop Hollingsworth called upon Mr. Powel for announcements.

Bishop Hollingsworth then called upon Ms. Maxanna Dyne-Demko (St. Andrew's, Barberton) to move the adoption of the rules of order. Ms. Dyne-Demko moved for the adoption of the rules of order. The motion was seconded and was carried.

Bishop Hollingsworth then called upon Ms. Arrington to explain delegate credentials, name badges, and procedures.

The Rev. Kay Ashby was elected for a three-year term, and the Rev. George Baum was elected for an unexpired term.

Bishop Hollingworth thanked the Nominating Committee and those who offered themselves for election.

He then called upon Mr. Tom Austin, Treasurer of the Diocese, to make his report. Bishop Hollingsworth thanked Mr. Austin for his continued service.

Bishop Hollingsworth called upon Ms. Jackie Acho-LeMay (St. Paul's, Cleveland Heights) to nominate the Treasurer of the Diocese. She nominated Mr. Tom Austin, Trinity Cathedral, Cleveland. The nomination was seconded. There were no other nominations. Bishop Hollingsworth asked for a vote to confirm Mr. Austin as Treasurer. The motion carried.

He then called upon Dr. Clifford Bennett (St. Andrew's, Cleveland) to nominate the Secretary of Convention. He nominated Ms. Darcel Arrington (St. Andrew's, Cleveland). The nomination was seconded. There were no other nominations. Bishop Hollingsworth asked for a vote to confirm Ms. Arrington as Secretary. The motion carried.

Bishop Hollingsworth then called upon Ms. Dianne Audrick Smith (St. Andrew's, Cleveland), Chair of the Ohio Deputation, and the Rev. Evan Fischer (St. James, Wooster) to share their perspectives on their work and participation at the General Convention in Austin, Texas in July.

Bishop Hollingsworth called upon Ms. Sharon Watts to present and move to adopt the 2019 Program and Budget. She moved to adopt the budget. The motion was seconded. The motion carried.

Bishop Hollingsworth thanked the Finance Committee and the Finance Department for their hard work.

The Convention then stood in recess.

Following the recess, Bishop Hollingsworth invited attendees to come to the microphones to ask questions about General Convention to himself and the Rev. Gay Jennings. He also discussed the General Convention Resolution D078 that approved liturgies for trial use.

Bishop Hollingsworth called on Mr. Powel for directions regarding lunch and any announcements, after which the Convention then stood in recess.

After lunch, Bishop Hollingsworth called upon the Rev. Vincent Black, Canon for Christian Formation, to report on Happening. Rev. Black invited Mr. Richard Pryor III (Christ Church, Kent) to present as well. Bishop Hollingsworth then called upon the Rev. Greg Stark (St. Andrew's, Elyria and Christ Church, Oberlin) to report on the Youth Pilgrimage to Belize.

Bishop Hollingsworth then asked Ms. Katie Ong-Landini, Project Director, to provide an update on the construction at Bellwether Farm. Bishop Hollingsworth then called upon Bishop Arthur Williams, Jr. to provide a report on the status of the Third Century Scholarship Fund for Bellwether Farm.

Bishop Hollingsworth called on Mr. Fitzroy DaSilva (St. Paul's, Cleveland Heights), President of the Trustees, for a report on the activities of the Trustees of the Diocese of Ohio.

Bishop Hollingsworth then called upon the Rev. John Drymon (Trinity, Findlay) to present the report of the Committee on Constitution and Canons concerning proposed amendments to the Canons of the Diocese of Ohio.

The Rev. Drymon reported that the First Proposed Amendment to the Canons (page 30 of the Handbook,) was submitted by the Committee on Constitution and Canons. It has to do with filling vacancies on Diocesan Council, which the Canons provided be filled by a vote of Diocesan Council members. However, the committee identified a conflict between the Canons and the Constitution, and since the Constitution is supreme, a canonical amendment is required to resolve it. Filling vacancies on Diocesan Council is reserved to the Standing Committee, with the concurrence of the Bishop. Rev. Drymon moved for the adoption of the first proposed amendment to the Canons. The amendment passed.

Rev. Drymon reported that the Second Proposed Amendement to the Canons Canons is found on page 31 of the Handbook, and was submitted by the Committee on Constitution and Canons. It seeks to clarify the ways in which the Cathedral operates as a congregation with parochial status, thereby making it subject to the parochial requirements of the canons. He then moved for the adoption of the second

proposed amendment to the Canons. The amendment passed.

Rev. Drymon then reported that the third proposed amendment to the Canons is found on page 32 of the Handbook, and was submitted by the Committee on Constitution and Canons. It clarifies the criteria for determining membership for purposes of electing members of the Vestry at an annual meeting of a parish, by making reference to a related section of the canons. He then moved for the adoption of the third proposed amendment to the Canons. The amendment passed.

Rev. Drymon then reported that the fourth proposed amendment to the Canons is found on page 33 of the Handbook, and was submitted by the Development Council of Episcopal Community Services. The goal of the amendment is to reduce the size of the Council, which currently comprises 19 members. There is no reduction in the number of members who are elected by Convention, but the amendment does reduce the number of Bishop's appointees from six (6) to two (2). The other change beginning in line 13 is the removal of the Dean's appointee, reflecting that the Trustees of the Diocese (and not the Development Council) have authority over the Church Home Endowment. He then moved for the adoption of the fourth proposed amendment to the Canons. The amendment passed.

The Rev. Drymon then reported that the fifth proposed amendment to the Canons is found on page 34 of the Handbook, and was submitted by the Committee on Constitution and Canons. It adds a new section that permits electronic communication for compliance with canonical requirements and in holding diocesan meetings. He then moved for the adoption of the fifth proposed amendment to the Canons. The amendment passed.

Bishop Hollingsworth then called upon Mr. James Baker (Grace, Mansfield), President of the Trustees of the Diocese of Ohio, to give the report on its activities. After Mr. Baker finished his report, Bishop Hollingsworth presented him with a Bishop's Medal in recognition of his many contributions to the Diocese over decades of service.

Bishop Hollingsworth then called upon Mr. David Sloan, St. Paul's, Cleveland Heights, to present the report of the Committee on Resolutions. Mr. Sloan presented the first resolution (R1: On Clergy Compensation) and called for it to be adopted. An amendment was proposed to clarify the parental leave language on page 37 of the Handbook, which was approved. The resolution then carried. Mr. Sloan then presented the second resolution (R2: Resolution in Support of Increased Young Adult Outreach and Involvement) and called for it to be adopted. After discussion, the motion carried. Sloan then presented the third resolution (R3: Resolution submitted by the Committee on Constitution and Canons to Declare the parishes of St. Augustine's, Youngstown and St. Paul's, Marion to be Extinct) and the motion carried. Sloan then presented Resolutions of Courtesy and moved for the resolutions to be adopted. Bishop Hollingsworth thanked Mr. Sloan for his and the committees work.

Bishop Hollingsworth then called upon the Rev. Beth Frank, Chair of the Commission for Global and Domestic Mission (St. Mark's, Canton) and the Rev. Margaret D'Anieri, Canon for Mission (St. Paul's, Norwalk) to report of the work of the Commission for Global and Domestic Mission. Bishop Hollingsworth thanked them both for their work.

The Convention then stood in recess.

Following the recess, Bishop Hollingsworth called up the Rev. Brad Purdom, Canon for Congregations, to lead a table discussion on the Way of Love.

Following the table discussion, Bishop Hollingsworth called upon the Rev. Alex Barton (Church of the Redeemer, Lorain), Ms. Kate Gillooly (St. Luke's, Cleveland), and Ms. Michelle Killin-Keith (St. Peter's, Lakewood) to report on Connecting Communities. After their presentation, the Bishop thanked them all for their efforts.

Bishop Hollingsworth then called upon Ms. Laura Hnat, Chief Development Officer, to provide an update on the Bishop's Annual Appeal. The Bishop then thanked Ms. Hnat for her work.

Bishop Hollingsworth then introduced and welcomed clergy new to the Diocese, and thanked retiring clergy that were present, and lay and clergy who have completed their service to various commissions and committees.

Bishop Hollingsworth then nominated the following to four-year terms on the Commission on Ministry:

- The Rev. George Baum (St. Timothy's, Massillon)
- The Rev. Gary Franklin (Trinity, Toledo)
- The Rev. Rachel Kessler (Harcourt Parish, Gambier)
- Ms. Denise Miller (St. Hubert's Kirtland Hills)

Bishop Hollingsworth also nominated the Rev. Dr. Brian Wilbert (Christ Church, Oberlin) to serve a three-year unexpired term.

Bishop Hollingsworth then asked for a second to the nominations. There were no other nominations and the motion carried.

Bishop Hollingsworth then asked if there was a majority of the Convention that desired a reading of the reports. Hearing none, the reports of the following were submitted in writing:

Bishop Hollingsworth inquired if the Convention had any unfinished business. Hearing none, he called upon Mr. Powel to provide any final announcements or instructions.

Bishop Hollingsworth then called upon Ms. Deb Shamlin to lead closing prayers.

He then asked for a motion to adjourn the 202^{nd} Annual Convention of the Diocese of Ohio. The motion was presented, seconded, and carried.

Convention was adjourned.

The Episcopal Address and the Bishop's Papers

The Bishop's Address 2018

It is heartening to be with all of you this evening as we open the 202nd Convention of the Diocese of Ohio with this celebration of the Holy Eucharist. I am grateful to the staff and communicants of the Cathedral for their hospitality and caring welcome. Thank you. I want to express particular thanks this evening to Paul Gaston, who has served the Cathedral and the Diocese so generously as Acting Dean for going on two years. With the Cathedral wardens' announcement this week of the election of a new Dean, Paul will begin handing on the responsibilities he has so ably and patiently carried out during this time of transition. Thank you, Paul, for your generous companionship and steady hand. We are all very grateful.

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After the last two diocesan conventions that served as the bookends to our bicentennial commemoration, it is good to have, this year, a simpler, perhaps more intimate time together. As well, given the violent and hate-inspired events of the last three weeks – in Jeffersontown, Pittsburgh, Thousand Oaks, and elsewhere across the country – and the emotionally and spiritually exhausting acrimony and negativity of the mid-term election cycle, it feels particularly important to be with one another tonight in our cathedral church, this space that manifests both our aspiration and Jesus's prayer that we as a diocese are one in him.

We are gathered predominately in the nave, a word that comes from the Latin word for ship, navis, from which also come navy and navigate. This part of the church is so named because it resembles the inverted hull of a boat. We come to this cathedral church tonight, as we come to our home churches every week, to be reminded that indeed we are all in the same boat, given to one another by God, each of us a holy gift whom God intends both to bear and to receive God's own love, to and from one another, to and from the whole world. We come together to hear the Word of the God who loves all without exception; to give thanks for the continually incarnating love that God relentlessly provides through the Christ we

seek and serve in all others; and to join anew in Jesus's sacrifice, surrendering to that love again and again and again.

Presiding Bishop Curry articulated this in NPR's 1A interview on Election Day, in which he also gave a shout-out to the Diocese of Ohio and our Love God. Love your neighbor. Change the world. * tagline. He spoke of the essential responsibility to teach the mature Jesus of Nazareth, not just the Christmas Jesus, and referencing the familiar spiritual, to tell the love of Jesus, how he died to save us all. Then he continued explaining the hymn, proclaiming that there is a balm in Gilead, and it is the way of love. We come together tonight, even and perhaps particularly in the midst of these divisive and acrimonious times, to tell the love of Jesus, not just the soft, sweet love of the crèche scene, but the love that leads to the Cross, the love that costs us something, perhaps everything, to "tell the love of Jesus, and say he died for all."

We begin our Diocesan Convention tonight, on the 80th anniversary of Kristallnacht, by coming together to proclaim the way of love to one another and, through our life and ministry, to the world. We gather here to rededicate ourselves to bringing the way of love to life in all that we do. That is the vocation of the body of Christ, and it begins with us.

Look at us. Look around you and see who we are. Beneath the surface of faces, some familiar and some new, are these truths. We do not all think alike. We do not all experience the world in the same way. We do not all hold the exact same values and priorities. And I am certain that we did not all vote the same. On issues about which Jesus spoke with passion and clarity, we often hold opposing views and are led by those views to very different actions. We read and hear the same Gospel stories about money and immigration and power and oppression, about honesty and accountability and forgiveness and compassion, about neighbors and strangers and children and those in need. But we hear them in different ways, because we are so different. As a result, our actions, although informed by a faith we share, may differ widely. The results of this week's

elections reflect this in race after race and ballot issue after ballot issue. We, across the country and in this very room, are divided on countless aspects of our common life, often right down the middle. The minority and majority are frequently only a few percentage points apart, but their perspectives may be miles from one another. Yet we come here tonight, as we do in our parishes week in and week out, to eat from the same plate and drink from the same cup, to offer each other what God gives us to share in the scripture and at this table, a taste of heaven and a sip of salvation.

There are many people in this room whom I admire and love, people whom I am certain God loves, yet I cannot, for the life of me, understand how they can hold views and convictions so different from my own. I suspect that, whatever your politics and moral perspectives, you may have similar feelings. On my bad days, it irks me that God loves them as much as God loves me. And on my really bad days, I pray that God might nonetheless love me as much as I know God loves them. As passionate as I am about particular issues, sometimes I hope the topics just don't come up. I know I'm not alone in this. I get letters from communicants of our parishes who don't believe that politics has a place in church. I don't think this is so much a theological argument as it is a yearning for some peace, for a place where our differences don't separate us from each other. I can understand that. And in plenty of Christian churches across our country that is accomplished by expecting everyone in the congregation to share the same political views. Rarely could you find that in an Episcopal church, for which I am grateful. For if we make our church a place of peace by avoiding our differences, a place where we check at the door what differentiates us from one another, we create a fantasy that serves only to keep us apart. That is not what God intends for us; nor is it what Jesus taught.

The Gospel reading for this evening's service comes from the propers for the Unity of the Church. We have come to refer to this passage from the 17th chapter of John's Gospel as Jesus's "high priestly prayer," as it recounts his petition to God on behalf of the church and what it should be. In his prayer, Jesus tells God, "I have made your name known to those whom you gave me from the world." In Jesus's culture and time, the name of any person or thing was a living expression of its very nature. A remnant of this understanding we still use when we talk

about damaging a person's good name, referring to demeaning her very being. This claim, "I have made your name known," means that Jesus has revealed God's true being, both by what he has taught and by how he has lived. In his prayer, Jesus makes clear his expectation that those to whom he has revealed God's true nature will become one with it, as he has. Practically, that means relating to the world God loves in the way Jesus does, with humility and openness to others, yet without avoiding or denying the realities and diversity of every human being.

As his conversation with God continues, Jesus explains what the church needs to be, using the relationship between himself and God as the model. He expects us to maintain the integrity of our own experience and identity, and at the same time make room within ourselves for one another and our rich differences. He expects this of us to the end that we might be changed, be made more whole, just as he is differentiated from the first person of the Trinity and at the same time one with it – united but not uniform. "As you are in me and I am in you, may they also be in us."

The unity of the coming church which Jesus invokes in this prayer, which he calls into being, is not something he expects us to find in the sweet by-and-by, but today, in this life, amidst all the complexity and diversity which the power of evil will relentlessly use to turn us against one another and divide us. Jesus understands that the church is that community where we find unity not by subtraction, but by addition, not by avoiding our differences, but by gathering them up and by struggling with them together. That holy struggle, Jesus knows, will bring us to a clearer understanding of God's dream of justice and reconciliation and peace. That is what Jesus means when he prays that we may be sanctified in truth. Not my truth or your truth, but God's truth.

Tonight we celebrate the Holy Eucharist, the Great Thanksgiving, using one of the Expansive Language liturgies accepted for use beginning the first of the year by Resolution D078 of last summer's General Convention. I will speak more about these liturgies tomorrow. But for now, I want to recognize that we do not refer to this as alternative language, but expansive language. The implication is that this is not an either/or proposition, but a both/and one. The expansive intention is not to divide, but to include, to make bigger, more whole, more complete.

These new liturgical options, added to those in the Book of Common Prayer and Enriching our Worship, broaden our worship. They make more comprehensive our expressions of gratitude, sacrifice, and commitment when we gather in common devotion. With the addition of these liturgies, we expand the language of praise and thanksgiving, the language of our theological expression and spiritual worship.

Understanding that liturgy is practice, a model and guide for how we live, I can't help wondering what might be the expansive language of our politics. How do we practice talking together about our differences, at home and at church, in ways that are not intended to divide and separate us, but to bring us together, to bring us to a new and more productive, perhaps a more godly understanding? And what is the expansive language of the heart that allows us both to speak more inclusively and to hear more inclusively? Can we trust God enough to speak our truths together in love, not expecting that one will prevail over another, rather that together we may come closer to God's truth? Can we tell our own truth with humility, in the knowledge that it is very likely not the truth, not God's truth? "For my thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways my ways,' says the Lord. 'For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts." (Isaiah 55:8-9)

Can we share Jesus's confidence in the faithful, in us, that allowed him to pray, "I am not asking you to take them out of the world," not asking God to separate us from the challenges of living. Neither, surely, is Jesus asking us to distance the needs and concerns of the world from of our life as the church: poverty, gun violence, opioid addiction, racial oppression, health care, education, immigration, and social polarization. Of course, each of these has political implications; they form and inform how we live together as a society. That is why they belong in our prayers and parish forums, our formation programs and service to others. Jesus knew this when he prayed for the vocation of the church, just before he was crucified for the political issues that were at the heart of his ministry.

Can we believe, as Jesus does, that we all may be one, not in spite of our differences, but indeed as a consequence of them? Sisters and brothers in Christ, the world is desperate for models of living together with difference in ways that make us more whole and more holy. God is ceaselessly calling us to be such a model, to show forth, by our patient, generous, honest, and humble work, the way of love. That is the vocation of the church, it is the answer to Jesus's prayer, and it begins with each of us and in each of our congregations. It begins with the expansive understanding that through our diversity and differences we are not divided, but become more whole, more complete, more fully in the image of God.

Jesus prayed, "The glory that you have given me I have given them, so that they may be one, as we are one, I in them and you in me, that they may become completely one, so that the world may know that you have sent me and have loved them even as you have loved me."

Amen.

Reports to Convention

Treasurer's Report 2018

Good morning. My name is Tom Austin, and I'm the Treasurer of the Diocese of Ohio. This is my annual report to the Diocesan Convention.

My report will cover the areas of financial position of the Diocese, Joint Investment Fund or JIF, and parish reporting and compliance.

Financial Position of the Diocese

The availability of cash and investments for short-term liquidity is excellent. There are no issues with long-term sustainability at this time.

Internal financial controls are enhanced by an annual external audit and the Finance and Audit Committees of Council. I thank members of both committees for their faithful service. We continue to receive unqualified opinions from our auditors that confirm our controls are working effectively.

The 2018 operating budget reflects a smaller than anticipated deficit at September 30th. We expect the budget will result in a break-even position or a modest surplus at year-end.

The statement of activities for all Diocesan funds shows a deficit at this time, which is attributable to realized and unrealized investment losses.

Pledges from the Planting for Tomorrow campaign continue to be received on a timely basis. Four parishes have now collected 100% of their goal and will receive all of their remaining pledge receipts. Over 92% of the Diocesan portion of the Planting for Tomorrow pledges has been collected.

We look forward to 2019, the first full year of operations at Bellwether Farm, including the inaugural season of camp.

Detailed financial information for both the Diocese and Joint Investment Fund can be found online in the Convention section of the website.

Joint Investment Fund

The recent volatility of the stock and bond markets has not impacted how and where our money is invested. We don't try to time the market. We remain confident in the governance structure, the faithful Episcopalians who serve as Trustees, and our investment advisors, Clearstead Advisors. Our assets are invested for the long-term support of many Diocesan ministries.

The president of the Trustees, Jim Baker, will present a more detailed report of the Trustees' activity this afternoon. The new Socially Responsible Investment Policy of the Trustees can be found on the Diocesan website under parish resources, finance office. We commend it to you, whether or not your parish in invested in JIF.

Currently, 46 parishes and 3 Episcopal organizations participate in the Joint Investment Fund.

Parish Reporting and Compliance

Since the last Convention, the Diocesan Council approved 3 capital loans totaling \$46,646 and 6 capital grants totaling \$75,838. As interest rates have increased over the past several years, the interest rate of 4.5% for Diocesan loans is now below the current prime rate of 5.25%. Your parish may want to consider doing capital

projects now to take advantage of our lower rates.

Most parishes met all of their reporting requirements this year.

Last year, the Episcopal Church in New York closed access to its online reporting system for parochial reports on its canonical deadline of May 1st. We want all parishes to file their reports by that date. In an effort to encourage timely filing, the Episcopal Church mailed all materials on November 1st requesting dioceses mail information to parishes by December 1st. The Finance Office will comply with this request. The Diocesan deadline for parochial reports remains March 1st.

Church Pension Group, or CPG, is transitioning payment of lay pensions to allow employer, employee and RSVP contributions to be made online rather by check.

Every parish is required to have its books and records audited every year by one of the 4 available methods, depending on its size. Most parishes are required to use the Diocesan audit team for its audit, at least once every 3 or 4 years. The Diocesan audit team completed 24 audits this year and the small committee audit method continues to be well received.

It is my continuing pleasure to serve as the Treasurer of the Diocese of Ohio. Thank you for your attention.











The purpose of The Trustees of the Diocese of Ohio is to oversee the investment management and administration of the Joint Investment Fund, hold title to property from closed or imperiled parishes, and dispose of acquired property as authorized. These duties may include authorizing expenditure from accounts of The Joint Investment Fund, setting an annual spending rate, and hiring managers, advisers, and custodians for the funds.

Actions taken:

- Elected James Baker to serve as President of the Trustees for the year.
- Approved rebalancing the portfolio and the disbursement of a total of \$4,070,000 to the Diocese for cash needs (income distributions and principal withdrawals).
- Received a report from Hartland & Co., investment advisers, on the SRI audit for the year 2017.
- The audit of Socially Responsible Investment (SRI) showed that .35% of the fair market value (FMV) of the investments were held in the prohibited categories of tobacco and gaming. These investments were not direct investments, but held indirectly through mutual funds.
- Received a report of fees paid by the portfolio in 2017 from Hartland & Co. The overall fees were 80 basis points, or .80%. The investment adviser was paid 16 basis points, the custody fee was 4 basis points, and investment managers fees and the fees imbedded in mutual funds were .60%, or 60 basis points. The expense ratio of investment managers and mutual fund fees were lower for 14 of 16 investments, compared to Morningstar average category fees, and for 15 of 16 investments compared to Morningstar average institutional fees.
- Approved the sale of real estate associated with the closed parishes of St. Augustine's, Youngstown, and St. Paul's, Marion.
- Authorized Sue Leishman, CFO to disburse \$80,000 to the ECS Development Council from Church Home funds.
- Approved allocating the 2017 operating surplus of \$110,444 to designated operating reserves of the Diocese of Ohio.
- Authorized continuing the 4.5% spending rate for the calendar year 2019. The rate is applied to the

- 12- quarter average unit value at June 30th each year to determine the monthly distribution rate for the subsequent calendar year.
- Received reports from Hartland & Co. on investment performance and performance vs. peers.
- The calendar year 2017 return of the JIF portfolio was 16.3% vs. the benchmark return of 15.1%. At March 31st, 2018, the 10-year performance versus endowments and foundations with assets between \$50- \$250 million showed a 7.2% return for the portfolio (5th percentile), and 6.4% return for the peer group (22nd percentile).
- Authorized continuing the current level of operating support for St. Barnabas, Bay Village until a revised plan is formulated and presented to the Trustees. The new priest-in-charge, Rev. Alex Martin, will be consulted to develop the revised plan.
- Authorized the purchase of real estate in Wakeman Twp. that is currently being used in an industrial chicken operation by the seller, Byron Dalton. The purchase price was \$3.45 million. Once the current egg laying cycle is complete in July 2019, the Diocese will begin repurposing the property.
- Met with the ad hoc committee of the Trustees in two special meetings regarding the construction costs of Bellwether Farm. Authorized the liquidation of \$1,385,239 of Diocesan investments in June 2018, and an additional \$465,746 of Diocesan investments in August for additional construction costs for the project.
- Adopted a revised Socially Responsible Investment (SRI) policy which incorporates ESG factors.
- ESG factors are environmental, social and governance factors used by companies and organizations in their governance and operations. The Trustees will begin including these ESG factors in the process of selecting investments for the portfolio. Previously, the Trustees attempted to identify investments that were consistent with Episcopal values and negative screens adopted by previous Diocesan Conventions. The current negative screens are companies that derive 10% or more of their revenues from tobacco and/or gaming activities. The new SRI policy expands the current policy to incorporate both inclusionary and exclusionary factors when choosing investments. It is hoped that future investments will be chosen for their financial performance as well as their social impact.

The purpose of the Loans and Grants Committee of the Diocese of Ohio is to review capital loans and grants requests from parishes, and make recommendations to Diocesan Council for final approval/rejection. Diocesan Council also establishes guidelines for parishes to use in the application process, and the Council periodically reviews and updates these guidelines.

A total of \$49,646 in loans were approved, as well as \$75,338 in grants.

Loans For Capital Projects

- Approved a loan of \$15,623 to St. Mark 's, Canton for repairs to the heating and air conditioning system. The terms of the loan are 3 years, 4.5% interest.
- Approved a loan of \$24,194 to All Saints Church in Parma for repairs to the catch basin in the parking lot and repaying the lot. The terms of the loan are 5 years, 4.5% interest.
- Approved a loan of \$9,829 to St. Andrew's, Elyria for repairs to their flat roof. The terms of the loan are 3 years, 4.5% interest.

Grants For Capital Projects

- Approved a \$10,245 grant to St. Mark 's Church, Sidney for a new HVAC system and sewer repairs mandated by the city.
- Approved a \$13,351 grant to Church of the Ascension for repairs to the elevator, roof, and masonry.
- Approved a grant of \$24,194 to All Saints Church, Parma for repairs to the catch basin and repaving the parking lot.
- Approved a grant of \$15,623 to St. Mark 's, Canton for repairs to its heating and air conditioning system.
- Approved a grant of \$9,829 to St. Andrew's, Elyria for repairs to its flat roof.
- Approved a grant of \$2,096 to St. Andrew's, Akron for roof repairs.
- The Committee has no budget. Funds are available for capital loans and grants from three separate funds invested in the Joint Investment Fund.

Commission on Ministry 2018

Meetings: The COM had 7 regular meetings,

1 retreat, 2 ordinations and 1 daylong conference

The purpose of the Commission on Ministry (COM) is to advise and assist the Bishop in the work of discernment, formation, and support for persons in Holy Orders and Lay Professionals in the Diocese of Ohio. The primary tasks of the Commission includes determining, together with the Bishop, the present and future needs in the diocese's ministry; and recruiting and assisting in the selection of personnel for Holy Orders.

- 1. Ordinations: Since the 201st Convention, COM has overseen the following ordinations: Gregory Stark and Alexander Barton to the priesthood.
- 2. Clergy Compensation: The COM determined clergy compensation standards in conjunction with the direction of the CFO and the cost of living index, and offered an updated R1; concerns for parishes dealing with rising healthcare, while still attending to the professional and personal needs of the clergy and lay professionals and their families.
- 3. Scholarship Assistance: The Diocese of Ohio has been fortunate to be able to provide substantial financial assistance to individuals who are in the process of education and formation for ordained ministry. The Diocese's ability to offer scholarships for theological education is a result of the generosity of a number of benefactors over the years that have made provisions in their wills for such endowments. This year the fund will allow for 12 Seminarians to receive support in the range of \$3,000 \$10,000. Through this same fund and in conjunction with the Bishop's Appeal, the Commission on Ministry makes it possible for newly ordained clergy to have internship, which is important training if there are to be only a few curacies available.
- 4. Developing Ministry: This year the Diocese of Ohio has again joined with the Bexley Seabury Federation in a low residency Masters of Divinity program with six local students. Six of these students will have three year internships in diocesan parishes, for both practical and hands on learning, while subsidizing the cost of seminary.
- 5. Deacon Formation Program: A key piece in our diocesan priority is to develop servant leaders through a strong network of deacons who are able to both call members of the diocese to develop their own diaconal ministry and assist individuals in understanding how their actions are spiritually formative. In 2017, five deacon postulants began work with the program director Kate Gillooly, as well as Anne Coen, the Rev. Debra Bennett and the Diocesan Deacons in the first year of study and fieldwork.
- 6. Discernment: The COM hosted Ministry Discernment Day for those discerning a call to ordained ministry on October 13, 2018.
- 7. Thank you: Ms. Anne Coen, Ms. Cynthia Smith, the Rev. Aaron Gerlach, and the Rev. Kay Ashby for their four years of faithful service, and a special thanks to the Rev. Evan Fischer for his leadership over the last three years.

Archives 2018

The work of preserving our diocesan history continued with grace and favor this past year. On the heels of the 200th anniversary of the founding of our diocese in 1817, we continued the celebration with the 200th anniversary of the election of Philander Chase as our first bishop in 2018. In 2019 we will celebrate the 200th anniversary of his consecration on February 11, 2019.

During 2018 the archives began utilizing the former Sacred Path display case which is now located just outside of the Bishop's office at Trinity Commons. The first display consisted of church plates, mugs and glasses. Our Diocesan Archives has acquired the beginning of a good collection of china bearing the images of diocesan parish churches: St. Peter's Church, Ashtabula; St. James Church, Boardman; St. Paul's Church, Canton; Trinity Cathedral, Cleveland; Church of the Epiphany, Euclid; Christ Church, Huron; St. Paul's Church Norwalk, Grace Church, Mansfield; Christ Church, Oberlin; Grace Church, Ravenna; Christ Church, Shaker Heights; Grace Church, Sandusky; Trinity Church, Toledo; St. Andrew's Church Youngstown; St. Augustine, Youngstown; St. John's Chuch, Youngstown; We also have a goodly number of mugs from parishes and diocesan organizations. We also have a pewter plate commemorating Jubilee College—now defunct (the second college which Bishop Chase founded when he became the Bishop of Illinois) and commemorative plate from Coventry Cathedral given to Bishop Burt at the time of our diocesan sesquicentennial celebration in 1967.

The second display in the case commemorates the 2018 General Convention complete with convention buttons, pamphlets, china mugs, a bobble head figure of Presiding Bishop Curry (offered as a fund raiser for FORMA-the Episcopal Christian Educators Advocacy Organization) and a 2018 Convention Prayerbook signed by the Ohio Deputation and our three bishops in attendance: Hollingsworth; Persell, Williams.

There are also framed posters in English and Spanish by the Presiding Bishop hanging nearby and the Ohio Deputation placard which is also framed and hanging near the display case. This re-purposed display case gives us a secure place to highlight many aspects of our diocesan history and we are grateful for the opportunity to use it as such.

Our 2018 signed prayerbook will join a collection of signed convention prayerbooks which were donated to the archives by the estate of the late Sterling Newell, Esq. through the work of our Canon-to-the-Ordinary, William Powel, Esq. Canon Powel has been sorting through a wall of boxes from Sterling's effects and our Diocesan Archives have reaped the benefit of important letters, programs, journals and signed General Convention Prayerbooks! Thanks be!

Our Diocesan Archives has also become the repository for records and certain church furnishings from two parishes which closed this past year: St. Augustine's Church, Youngstown and St. Paul's Church, Marion. The records for each parish, which we were able to acquire, are now safely housed in our archives awaiting to be catalogued. In addition a representative liturgical item from each parish (The Sanctus Rood Beam from the altar at St. Augustine's and a officiant's chair from St. Paul's) are being housed in the archives. A portion of the liturgical furnishings from St. Augustine's were given into the care of St. John's Youngstown in the hope that they can be incorporated into the liturgical life of that parish and will help keep the memory and mission of St. Augustine's alive for the parish members who are now part of St. John's parish family. The pulpit and lectern were sent to Bellwether Farm and the Bishop's Chair and two matching side chairs have been re-purposed and are now in use at Christ Church, Oberlin.

In April I gave a keynote address to the 2018 BEST (Bishop's Executive Secretaries Together) at the invitation of our own Bishop's Executive Secretary, Eva Cole. The conference was held in Cincinnati, Ohio and it was my joy to be there along with Eva and Bishop Hollingsworth. My presentation preached on the importance of maintaining Diocesan Archival Records and also the importance of sending copies of each diocesan convention journal to the Archives of the Episcopal Church in Austin, Texas in a timely fashion.

In May I gave a presentation to the ad-hoc archives committee of St. Christopher-by-the-River, Gates Mills. This committee is beginning the work of creating a parish archives.

In August I gave a presentation on our Diocesan Archives to the Diocese of Ohio Chapter of the Daughters of the King at their annual meeting and installation of officers which was held at St. Martin's Church in Chagrin Falls, Ohio.

Since the 201st Convention I wrote two articles for Church Life. "Pioneer Bishops, Clergy, and Churches on Ohio's Frontier (co-authored with Lynette Williams for Church Life Winter 2017) and "The General Convention of 1817: Wheels in Motion for the Episcopal Diocese of Ohio." (Church Life Summer 2018). A Third article on the Episcopacy of Philander Chase is due to be published in the 2018 Winter edition of Church Life and it is my privilege to work with Jessica Rocha, Beth Bergstrom and Rita Rozell (who retired this past June after a long tenure with our diocese). Additionally, I assisted Laura Hnat, Canonto-the-Ordinary William Powel, and, of course, Bishop Hollingsworth with various research and other projects. I remain grateful for Eva Cole's assistance with helping to keep our records current and to assist me as needed.

During this past summer I took a sabbatical leave from my parish family which involved travel during the months of June and July. It was our great fortune to welcome Nan Hunter who stepped in as "Archivist pro tempore" and helped supervise our crackerjack team of Summer Interns: Madison McDowell and Richard Pryor, III who served a second year as interns in the Archives and Callan Swaim-Fox and Cecelia Payne who were newcomers to the Archives this Summer. They were, every single one of them, worker bees and accomplished a great deal of work which included the day to day projects of answering questions and researching the records of defunct parishes and continuing the work of organizing our collections.

Additionally, this year's summer interns tackled the mountainous job of scanning every photograph in our archives. They were aided by Diocesan Tech Advisor, Ed Vennetti, who set up and installed our new Epson Series DS-50000 scanner which allows us to scan oversize photographs and to scan in high resolution for more detail. Ed also arranged for our digital photo collection to be stored on the cloud which saves space on our desktop and laptop computers.

We were fortunate to have had the help of Mr. John Mercer, a parish member at Christ Church, Shaker Heights, who facilitated the transfer to our archives of Byrdie Lee's collection of historical material relating to the history of the Union of Black Episcopalians in Ohio and in the wider church. As an historian herself, Byrdie, a 2018 recipient of the Bishop's medal and now of blessed memory, bequeathed to us a rich treasure trove which fills in many gaps concerning the contributions of and ministry of Episcopalians of African descent in the Diocese of Ohio and beyond. We are indebted to John Mercer for rescuing this material from Byrdie's home as the collective memory of those in and around the Bishop's office last believed it to be traveling around in the trunk of her automobile!

I am in my second of six years as a member of the Board of the Archives of the Episcopal Church. It is my privilege to serve on the Executive Committee of that Board as Secretary. I am grateful to the Rev. Gay Jennings, President of the House of Deputies, who nominated me at the 2015 General Convention.

This is an exciting time to be on this body which our church canons gives oversight for maintaining the history and historical records of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the United States of America. We are hoping to move forward on furnishing a dedicated space large enough to bring the entire collection together under one roof within the next few years. Keep your eyes and ears open for more information about this venture. The Board meets for a face to face meeting twice during each triennium and holds quarterly conference calls with the Cannonical Archivist to offer our advice and help. It was my joy to help staff the excellent Archives exhibit at the 71st General Convention of the Episcopal Church held during the summer of 2018 in Austin, Texas. If you haven't visited the website of the Archives of the Episcopal Church I commend it to you. Log onto https://www.episcopalarchives.org/

In an effort to learn what is going on more broadly in the wider church with regard to records retention and telling the story of the Episcopal Church I have become members of three organizations: The Episcopal Archivist's Network, The National Association of Episcopal Historians and Archivists, and the Historical Society of the Episcopal Church. The NEHA publishes a quarterly magazine called "The Historiographer." The HSEC publishes a quarterly journal called Anglican and Episcopal History.

The archives is generally open from 10 a.m. - 5 p.m. on Thursdays. (216-771-4815 ext. 465) I am happy to open it at other times depending on my duties as the Rector of Christ Church, Oberlin. Diocesan Staff Liaison: The Rev. Margaret D'Anieri, Canon for Mission

Resolution R4 of the 190th Convention of the Diocese of Ohio in 2006 established the concept for the Commission for Global and Domestic Mission (CGDM).

The mission of the CGDM is to develop partnerships in the mission and service of Jesus Christ, engage the diocese in these partnerships, support existing parish mission work, and administer the domestic – outside the Diocese – and global giving of the Diocese of Ohio.

The Commission runs under the auspices of the Operating Guidelines, last revised and approved by Diocesan Council in 2013. Commission membership consists of one lay or clergy member from each Mission Area and two at-large members. CGDM has four working committees: Belize, Tanga, Domestic, and Grants. Each Commission member is expected to be an active participant in one or more of these working committees. By the last quarter of 2018, the Commission had three openings and two members completing two consecutive terms. Bishop Hollingsworth, Canon D'Anieri, and the Commission agree that the coming year should include a time of reflection on CGDM's structure and how it encourages, equips, and supports mission opportunities for individuals and parishes.

The Commission thanks the Rev. Margaret D'Anieri, Canon for Mission, and Antoinette Taylor, Administrative Assistant, for their service to the Commission.

Global Mission

The Global work of the Commission focuses on partnerships which cross boundaries of social difference, specifically with the Diocese of Tanga, Tanzania, and the Diocese of Belize. The Commission continues to draw inspiration from Titus Presler's book Going Global with God. The blessings and challenges of international mission fall within Presler's seven marks of the mission companion (witness, pilgrim,

prophet, servant, ambassador, host, sacramental reconciliation). They set a framework for the many considerations posed by the blessings and challenges of international mission.

CGDM continued its membership in the Global Episcopal Mission Network (GEMN). This year the Commission sent the Rev. David Kendall-Sperry to the annual GEMN conference. Margaret D'Anieri and Michelle Killin-Keith, Youth Minister at St. Peter's, Lakewood, also attended. Members of our Ohio-Belize Project Science Success team (Dr. Matthew Teare and David Marcrum from Ohio and Allana Gillette and Akira Genus from Belize) presented at the conference and shared experiences and lessons learned.

Committee for the Diocese of Belize Partnership:

At its May 2018 Synod, the Anglican Diocese of Belize adopted a resolution extending its relationship with the Diocese of Ohio to January 2024. The resolution acknowledged the depth of the relationships developed to date and specifically acknowledged mission activities involving youth, youth ministry and the Episcopal Church Women. Following Synod, Ohio Seminarian Rachel Harrison began an internship in Dangriga. Our hope is that more seminarians will have an opportunity to engage in similar internships exposing them to ministry in a new context while also furthering the initiatives of our partnership.

Project Science Success continues to build resources and capacity of science teachers within Belize and identify the next generation of leaders within the Anglican schools in Belize. On-site evaluation of teachers' use of teaching methods has continued, as has collaboration in a summer science camp. The camp program has grown both in terms of campers and scholarship support (over \$5,000) from Diocese of Ohio parishes and individuals. St. Luke's, Chardon continues to fund a competitive small grants program for teachers to launch special projects in their classrooms. By mutual agreement, Ohio's involvement in this program will be phased out in 2019 and we will consider with our partners the new ways God might be calling us to collaborate.

Belize and Ohio youth joined together in July 2018 for a joint pilgrimage in Punta Gorda, a Belizean locale which challenged all participants to cross a boundary of difference. The North Central Mission Area youth group took the lead in organizing this opportunity with the Rev. Barbara McBride of Belize. Also, adult and youth leaders from Belize participated again in Ohio Happening, and then teamed with Ohioans to offer Happening in Belize. We appreciate the support of Canon Vincent Black and youth leaders to initiate Happening "Belize-Style."

Committee for the Diocese of Tanga, Tanzania, Partnership:

The Right Reverend Maimbo Mndolwa, Bishop of Tanga in Tanzania came to Ohio in November, 2017 in conjunction with the 201st Convention. He spent time at a reception for those who had been to Tanga at the home of Heather Nelson, met with Diocesan staff members, with people from St. Paul's, Cleveland Heights, with seminarians, and had time with Bishop Wright of Belize. In February, Bishop Mndolwa was elected Archbishop of Tanzania, while retaining his role as Bishop of Tanga. We look forward to developing next steps in partnership with the Diocese of Massachusetts.

Grants Committee:

The Commission merged Domestic Grants and Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) into one process. The committee reviews grant applications, works with applicants to ensure proposals meet SDG goals and have objective means to measure results, and makes recommendations to the full Commission. The committee also reviews grantee reports on implementation.

All grants are evaluated through the lens of the UN's Sustainable Development Goals:

Funding for 3 grants was approved in 2018:

- 1. \$4,000 to support the Summer Science Camp in Belize.
- 2. \$1,805 to purchase a technological interactive projector to support Project Science Success
- 3. \$4000 to St. Paul's, Cleveland Heights to support their project Filters for Families (FFF), "Promoting Good Health and Disaster Preparedness" in Orocovis, Puerto Rico.

The Commission continues to seek more applications for both domestic and global grants.

Domestic:

The Commission continues to assess how it might work with Episcopal Community Services (ECS), parishes, and other groups on joint mission efforts. We held a workshop at Winter Convocation with ECS to share information on work of Episcopal Migration Ministries (EMM) and opportunities to partner with the EMM conference in October. The Commission did not fill both slots for this training and will be sending the funds saved to Episcopal Relief and Development to support hurricane recovery efforts.

The Commission sent \$3000 to support the relief and recovery work of St. Philip's Episcopal Church in Southport, NC. Hurricane Florence left Southport with many needs, and St. Phillip's set up area volunteer teams to work closely with local agencies. CGDM had previously collaborated with St. Philip's in shipping

educational materials to support the Anglican Schools in Belize.

Mission Statement: The mission of the Commission is to work for healing and transformation in ourselves, our church, and society. The Commission fulfills its mission by exemplifying the following values: respect, compassion, inclusion, and an appreciation of our unique differences.

Meetings: The Commission met at Trinity Commons on December 9, 2017; March 3, 2018, and June 16, 2018, and has continued to do much of its work by email and small group meetings, as the larger group gatherings were not well attended. The Commission has developed four working groups: Training, Events, Communications, and the West Region Mission Area group.

Alex Barton, Debra Bennett, Margaret D'Anieri, Allison Hauserman and Anita Pruitt attended a gathering sponsored by the Absalom Jones Center for Racial Healing in Atlanta in February. The Center is a collaborative effort between The Episcopal Church and the Diocese of Atlanta. Its mission is "to provide tools and experiences that allow faith communities – and the larger community of individuals – to engage in dismantling racism through prayer, dialogue, pilgrimage, and spiritual formation." It gave us an opportunity to forge new connections in the context of conversations about creating "brave spaces" where we can have the hard conversations necessary for repentance and renewal.

The Training Group:

The Training Work Group continues to review the Seeing God's Face in Each Other (2011) materials and videos and Becoming the Beloved Community (2017) from the national church for use in the Diocese of Ohio. The group has wrestled with questions about the role of people of color in training contexts, and varying perspectives on whose work this is to do, particularly in all-Caucasian groups. After passage of Resolution R-2 at the 2017 Convention, the group's efforts have been to develop training for Diocesan Council at their overnight in December 2018 and to be ready to respond to requests for training from other groups, notably those in the seminarian cohort.

The Events Group:

This group has focused on publicizing existing events, and promoting resources for congregational use, particularly the video series "Door of Return" reflecting on a pilgrimage to sites in Ghana that were critical to the trans-Atlantic slave trade.

The Communications Group:

Communications has focused largely on providing a robust presence on the Diocesan web site and in sending out the periodic "Thoughts and Resources" flyer that suggests books, videos and other resources for individual and parish use.

The West Mission Area Group:

Starting in the fall of 2016, this group presents three fall and three winter events each year as a way for the Toledo area Episcopal Churches to engage the community; to educate, challenge, and ultimately inspire honest conversation. In 2018 these included:

Race and the Criminal Justice System: A Conversation – April 2018

Truth and Reconciliation: A Pilgrimage to Ghana – September 2018

Children's Storytelling: Peace Making Across Cultures - October 2018

"Racial Bias and the Danger of a Single Story" - November 2018



Appendix III

Resolutions as Adopted

R1: On Clergy Compensation

Resolved, that the minimum standard of full-time pension-based compensation (cash salary, utilities, housing, and Social Security tax reimbursement) for clergy serving congregations in the Diocese of Ohio during 2019 be established as follows:

- At least \$49,960 for assisting clergy
- At least \$60,480 for clergy in charge of congregations with an annual Normal Operating Income (NOI) of no more than \$186,000
- At least \$60,480+10% of NOI greater than \$186,000 up to \$372,000 for clergy in charge of congregations with an annual NOI greater than \$186,000.
- At least \$79,080 for clergy in charge of congregations with NOI greater than \$372,000; and be it further

Resolved, that each congregation prayerfully consider adjusting the current compensation level of their clergy to account for the increase in the cost of living and the clergy person's years of experience; and be it further

Resolved, that each employer of clergy in the Diocese of Ohio be encouraged to:

- Offer additional benefits either fully funded, or on a pre-tax salary reduction basis (e.g., dental insurance, reimbursement for routine dental care, annual medical examination, child-care allowance, etc.);
- Provide for sabbatical and parental leave; and be it further

Resolved, that each employer of such clergy in the Diocese of Ohio shall pay a minimum of 97.5% of the health insurance premium of the least expensive plan provided as an option by the Diocese for those clergy being paid less than \$60,480 (or the pro-rated part-time equivalent) and their eligible dependents or 95% of the health insurance premium of the least expensive plan provided as an option by the Diocese for the clergy being paid \$60,480 (or the pro-rated part-time equivalent) or more, and their eligible dependents. If an clergy chooses a health insurance plan that is more expensive, the additional premium is his or her responsibility, unless the Vestry, Diocese or other participating Episcopal institution agrees to pay the additional premium for such coverage. The employer may choose to pay 100% of its clergy's health care plan; and be it further

Resolved, that in addition to the above minimum standards, each employer of such clergy in the Diocese of Ohio shall:

- Make pension assessment payments as the Church Pension Fund shall determine [Note: The Church Pension Assessment is based on the following elements: Base salary; Social Security tax reimbursements; Cash housing allowance and utilities; Employer contributions to 403(b) or deferred compensation plan; Value of church-provided housing; Pre-tax contribution to Health Savings Account (HSA) clergy contribution up to IRS limits; and Other cash allowances (i.e., automobile, cell phone)];
- Provide appropriate reimbursement for expenses incurred in the course of fulfilling the responsibilities of the position, including the actual cost of the use of a personal automobile;
- Allow no fewer than four weeks of paid vacation annually;
- Allow no fewer than eight weeks of paid parental leave for the birth or adoption of a child for a member of the clergy, and follow the maternity leave benefits provided by Church Pension Group for members of the clergy (i.e., 12 weeks).
- Allow annual professional education/development leave of no fewer than two weeks, with a minimum allowance of \$800; and be it further

Resolved, that the provisions of this resolution be applied on a pro-rata basis to the minimum compensation and benefits related to positions that are less than full-time and more than one-quarter time; and be it further

Resolved, that every letter of agreement shall be revisited by the Vestry and the Rector with the clergy member at least once every two years. For parishes in which this has not happened in the last two years it should be done promptly and by December 31, 2018; and be it further

Resolved, that every letter agreement shall be submitted to the Bishop's Office in compliance with General Canon Title III.9.3 along with the most current version of the Compensation Worksheet provided by the Commission on Ministry (COM) andbe it further

Resolved, that (a) whenever clergy letters of agreement are amended, they should be submitted to the Bishop's Office in compliance with General Canon Title III.9.3; along with (b) the Compensation Worksheet provided by the Commission on Ministry to each parish; and be it finally

Resolved, Without regard to whether a letter of agreement has been amended, the Compensation Worksheet should be submitted by the parish for each clergy person to the Bishop's Office every two years, thereafter on or before May 1 in the odd years, for that current year's compensation.

Resolved, that those congregations/missions areas that are served by the ministry of a vocational deacon, would consider reimbursement for mileage and/or the costs associated with participation in ministries done on behalf of the congregations/mission areas, and that those congregations/mission areas that have long standing relationships with vocational deacons consider contributing to the annual continuing education costs of said deacon.

Rationale: The recommended levels of compensation represent a 2.4% Cost of Living Adjustment based on the change in the Midwest Region CPI-U for the year ending in July 2018.

Rationale: The reference to the maternity leave benefit provided by the Church Pension Group follows Resolution 2015-D030 of the General Convention to educate parishes that clergy who give birth are eligible for the 12-week short-term disability benefit.

Rationale: The work of the vocational deacon is to call all the baptized out into the world; this is by tradition, in this diocese, a non-stipendiary call. This diocese has relatively few vocational deacons and; therefore, they frequently are asked to travel long distances to serve those congregations/mission areas in need of a deacon.

R2: Resolution In Support Of Increased Young Adult Outreach And Involvement

Whereas, the 202nd Convention of the Diocese of Ohio should continue to implement procedures to recruit and include young adults (ages 18 to 30) in church affairs,

Now, Therefore, Be it Resolved, that an intergenerational Young Adult Outreach Task Force be established whose number and membership is to be determined by the Bishop to (1) study the success of parishes with high young adult engagement; and (2) propose diocesan-wide recommendations for further outreach and engagement to the 203rd Diocesan Convention (2019), and be it further

Resolved, that the Convention encourages the Committee on Nominations to actively recruit young adults to participate in the governance of the Diocese, including identification of candidates for Deputies and Alternate Deputies to General Convention, and be it further

Resolved, that this Convention continue to provide financial support for attendance at General Convention (i.e., registration fees, travel costs, hotel expenses, and per diem allowance) for Deputies and the First Alternate Deputy.

Explanation:

Young adults exist in the nebulous space between youth ministries and the established community of older congregants. Often lumped in with one or the other, there tends to be very little targeted programming for this demographic. As a result, young adults may feel less connected to their churches and may drift away from church activities. The Office of Young Adult and Campus Ministries of The Episcopal Church supports ministries of, to, and with young adults (ages 18-30) both on and off college campuses through the communities, resources and networks of the Episcopal Church. It is a specific age range that had been markedly absent from church counsels and activities. It covers the spectrum from those who are single and still navigating a search for their first full-time job, to those who are married and have children and full time jobs, as well as post high school students, and those who may have dropped out of high school and everyone else in that age range.

This resolution seeks to acknowledge and affirm those steps the Diocese already takes to include young adults in church governance. In addition, this resolution plans to build support for parishes looking for outreach ideas through establishing the Outreach Task Force. This will allow the Diocese to build on the strengths already present while offering support to parishes planning to branch out.

Finally, this resolution hopes to build engagement by young adults in church governance through encouraging the Committee on Nominations to actively recruit young adults. This will ensure that young adults are aware of all the opportunities available to them that they might not have heard of before.

Including young adults in church life is a necessary part of ensuring the continued vitality of our Church. When young adults leave the Church, they often take their children with them, depriving us of two generations of congregants. With this resolution in place, the Diocese of Ohio will be able to lead the charge on young adult outreach, recruitment, engagement, and involvement.

R3: Special Resolution Submitted By The Committee On Constitution And Canons

Be it Resolved, that this 202nd Convention acknowledges the end of the parish ministries of St. Augustine's, Youngstown and St. Paul's, Marion and that the Convention expresses its deep appreciation to the laity and clergy of these congregations for their years of faithful service to God and the people of their communities; and be it further

Resolved, that this Convention accepts this recommendation of the Committee on Constitution and Canons in accordance with Canons of the Diocese of Ohio (Title II, Canon 7), and declares St. Augustine's, Youngstown and St. Paul's, Marion to be extinct.

Rationale:

St. Augustine's Episcopal Church, Youngstown

Lenora Berry had a dream to establish an Episcopal Church in Youngstown for African-Americans. Although she was not an Episcopalian herself, she persisted and succeeded in persuading the Rector of St. John's, Youngstown, the Rev. Abner Lord Fraser, Jr., to support the founding of a mission. In 1908, the Board of Missions and Bishop William Leonard adopted St. Augustine's Mission, which was followed by the calling of its first full-time priest, the Rev. J. T. Ogburn. Over the years, the congregation took heed of Christ's call to serve one's neighbors, offering a variety of functions at the church, from AARP meetings, to free lunch programs, and basketball games. In recognition of their expression that "with God's help, all things are possible," the Diocese of Ohio gives thanks for the ministries of St. Augustine's Church.

St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Marion

Before St. Paul's, Marion became a formal parish, Episcopal worship services took place in Marion as early as 1828. Recognizing the need for a formal congregation, the wife of the town's founder, Susan Baker, urged Bishop Charles McIlvaine to send the congregation a priest. In 1849, McIlvaine granted this request and St. Paul's was received into the diocese at convention that October. In recent history, this congregation ministered to their community through their Food Pantry, an interfaith collaboration to provide weekly community meals, and their support of Alcoholics Anonymous. Although the church is formally closed, the congregation's over 180-year legacy will live on through its influence on the early history of Marion and the fruits of its ministry.

Overview of the 2019 Diocesan Program and Budget


The 2019 program and budget of the Diocese of Ohio is expected to decrease by \$3,211 or about 0.1% under the 2018 budget.

Details of proposed expenditures in each area are further explained in the accompanying narratives. The most significant changes are in the areas of Office Expenses in the Office of the Bishop and Support Offices and Fund Transfers.

The programs and activities funded in the budget are geared toward living out the mission statement of the Diocese: To GROW, GIVE and SERVE.

Figure 1 allocates expenses by ministry area. This chart reflects the current ministry area, and the expenses that support these areas. Personnel and shared operating costs, including office and building expenses, have been allocated to the respective ministry areas.

Diocesan Funding Sources for the 2019 Budget

Support from Congregations (Assessments)

Support from congregations (also known as assessments) continues to fund the largest share of the budget. In 2019, almost 2/3 of the budget, or 64.3% comes from support from parishes.

This line item is \$43,000 or about 1.84% less than the year 2018.

Endowment and Investment Income

These sections of the budget comprise about 16.4% of the revenue for the 2019 budget. Almost all of the income in these sections come from amounts invested in the Joint Investment Fund of the Trustees of the Diocese of Ohio (JIF). The Trustees authorize the spending rate for JIF funds on an annual basis. For 2019, the spending rate continues to be 4.5% annually. The income from these funds reflects an increase of 1.4% for 2019, due to the increased unit value of the JIF portfolio, using a rolling 12-quarter average. The endowment supporting the Bishop's Office is invested separately from the JIF, based on the donor's restriction. This endowment uses a 4% spending rule based on a rolling 3-year annual average.


Fees Received for Administrative Services

These amounts represent fees for administering certain endowments and accounting and administrative services provided to the JIF. In 2014, the Diocesan Council authorized these fees to be based on a June 30th annual valuation for the endowments. In general, these fees decreased due to a lower value for the JIF at June 30, 2018 versus June 30, 2017. Fees for administrative services fund about 6.8% of the 2019 budget.

Transfers from Special Funds

The transfers from special funds represent the reimbursement of expenses paid from non-operating or custodial funds. Without these special funds, important Diocesan programs and ministries might otherwise not take place. These amounts are offset by expenses in various areas of the budget. In 2019, the amount from special funds increases by \$23,000 to \$444,710, which is 12.5% of the total budget.

The Office of Ministry

Transition Ministry

The Office of Transition Ministry, working alongside the Bishop, assists parishes and individuals (lay and ordained) through a time of discernment and call. This year 15 congregations, including the Cathedral, have been or are currently in transition. Services provided to parishes include: assisting the wardens and vestries in planning during the interim period; providing interim consultants and names of potential interim clergy; coordinating with the national Office of Transition Ministry; publicizing openings in various venues; referencing and consulting with the Bishop about prospective candidates; providing resources and training for interim consultants and interim pastors; informing parishes of the progress of all searches; assisting in the final call and in the negotiation of a letter of agreement with the clergy person; and finally assisting in the start-up of the new ministry.

Meetings with the Diocesan Transition Officers across the country help match priests with parishes in the Diocese of Ohio. Training and continuing education for interim priests and interim consultants is imperative during the search process.

The Office of Transition Ministry is also helping parishes redefine themselves as the number of priests, retired and those retiring, continues to outpace the number of newly ordained priests. Churches are also undergoing transformation as they grapple with the inability to pay full time clergy and look into adapting a new model of what it means to be church. The Office of Christian Vocations is working alongside the Office of Congregational Development to help parishes come together to share ministries and resources with the possibility of shared clergy leadership.

Commission on Ministry

The primary purposes of the Commission on Ministry are to advise and assist the Bishop in the work of discernment and formation, and offer support for persons in Holy Orders, as well as to support the ministries of Lay Professionals in the Diocese of Ohio. The Commission works together with the Bishop on: the present and future needs of the diocese; recruiting and assisting in the selection of personnel for Holy Orders; providing for the guidance, pastoral care, and continuing education of clergy and lay professionals; determining clergy compensation standards; and attending to the professional and personal needs of the clergy and lay professionals and their families.

Clergy Formation Deacon Formation Program

This year the Deacon formation program is working with 7 people seeking ordination to the diaconate. The three-year program has four candidates in their third year and three people in their first year. The program will meet nine times at three-day retreats and several one day meetings in order to study and form community. Their formation also includes field placement in local churches and mission areas.

Priest Formation

Scholarship Assistance: The Diocese of Ohio has been fortunate to be able to provide substantial financial assistance to individuals who are in the process of education and formation for ordained ministry. The Diocese's ability to offer scholarships for theological education is a result of the generosity of a number of benefactors who over the years have made provisions in their wills for such endowments. The Diocese of Ohio was able to offer up to \$5,000.00 per semester to each seminarian this year. \$29,000.00 went to eight seminarians in the spring and \$36,000 went to eight this fall. The Diocese of Ohio is providing scholarships for 11 seminarians during the 2018-2019 academic year.

Special Ministries

Monies given to *Develop and Employ Creative Models for Congregational Ministry* is generated through donations to the Bishop's Annual
Appeal and the income earned from the Miller Endowment Fund. This year these funds

were used to supplement a Priest-in-Charge placement, for the Rev. Alexander Barton at Church of the Redeemer in Lorrain.

This is the third year of the Ohio Cohort program with Bexley Seabury Federation's low residency Masters of Divinity program for formation and fieldwork for those discerning a call to the priesthood. This year, there are four new students joining four others. All reside in the diocese of Ohio while attending school in Chicago. Some of the students will intern at a local parish for 10-15 hours a week and receive a stipend to offset tuition and living expenses, while others will work in congregations or non-parochial positions.

Clergy Development

In an effort to assist in the ongoing development of clergy, a variety of programs are offered. Clergy Days provide opportunities for clergy to gather with their Bishop. The annual Clergy Conference in May provides significant continuing education opportunities in addition to time for worship and building collegial relationships. At this year's conference were, the Rev. Charles Wynder, Staff Officer, Social Justice and Advocacy Engagement for the Episcopal Church, and musician Dr. Sandra Montes and her accompanying musician James Graves, leading the clergy in discussions about "Becoming Beloved Community." Clergy development also includes continuing education and sabbatical grants for clergy and lay professionals, which are funded from two endowment funds. Partnerships to provide continuing education programs on an ecumenical basis have allowed continuing education funds to be used more effectively in recent years.

Fresh Start

Fresh Start is a church wide program lead by diocesan clergy for those who have accepted new positions within the diocese. The purpose is to "support clergy . . . in navigating the critical period of transition in clergy leadership." It seeks

to foster healthy relationships among clergy and their congregations. The program goal is to build a culture in which mutual ministry of the clergy and congregation begins with a strong foundation.

A second grouping of the newly ordained meets both as a group and in combination with Fresh Start. This grouping provides an opportunity for the newly ordained to form a healthy start to ministry and form relationships with colleagues while exploring this odd new vocation to which they have answered a call.

Office for Congregations and Christian Formation

Overview of Full CCF Office Budget by line item or category:

- Administration: (\$8,000) This includes office, travel, and related expenses. This represents 3% of our expenditures.
- Grants for Congregations: (\$160,000)

 The largest expense for this office consists of direct grants and other support to congregations for new and/ or strategic ministries. The budget includes four types of grants for existing congregations (Ministry Enhancement, Targeted Revitalization, Congregational Development Programs and Training, and Strategic Mission Support). It also includes support for New Work outside of a traditional congregational space. These grants represent 56% of our expenditures.
- Youth and Children Formation Program and Grants: (\$17,000) Diocesan Youth programming remains the same as last year. The total budget is 8% of our expenditures.
- College and Young Adult Formation Program and Grants: (\$20,000) – This line item is to support parishes in direct college ministry and in more broadly focused young adult ministry. The total budget is 8% of our expenditures.

- Adult Formation Program and Grants: (\$3,000) These funds support direct grants to congregations for Adult Formation programming primarily focused on their own members. The total budget is 1% of our expenditures.
- Congregations and Christian Formation Commission: (\$1,000) The CFC has its own budget for expenses. This represents 0.3% of our expenditures.
- Other Expenses: (\$79,000) This category includes an additional line item for Education for Ministry (\$6,500). Winter Convocation is budgeted at (\$35,000). Other components include: (\$7,500) for Leadership Development Events, (\$25,000) for Additional Opportunities, (\$3,000) for Lay Preaching College, and (\$2,000) for Diocesan Resource Center. The total is 27.5% of our expenditures.

Diocesan, Episcopal Church, and Anglican Communion Responsibilities

This category of the budget represents expenses relating to our life as a diocese of The Episcopal Church in the Anglican Communion.

The largest item of \$398,950 is the Diocese of Ohio's share of The Episcopal Church's budget, as adopted by General Convention in 2018. The 2019 figure is \$3,090 less than the 2018 amount. Full payment of our calculated share is a long-standing commitment of the diocese. The support for the 2019 DFMS budget is calculated as follows:

(2017 Operating Income less \$140,000) x 15%

The 2018 General Convention lowered the exemption amount from \$150,000 to \$140,000 for the years 2019 to 2021. The assessment rate is unchanged at 15%.

The provincial synod assessment of \$5,671 is

unchanged from 2018. This amount of support for the Province V budget is .2% of our 2017 operating income reported to The Episcopal Church.

Expenses of the annual Diocesan Convention are budgeted at \$27,500, \$2,500 higher than 2018. The 2019 Diocesan Convention will be held outside the Cleveland area. An amount of \$2,500 is budgeted for Diocesan Council, which pays for copies, postage, and the annual orientation meeting in December for the full Council. This amount is unchanged for 2019.

The allocation for Reserve for Travel to General Convention is increased \$10,000 to \$18,000 for 2019 to begin funding for the 2021 General Convention in Baltimore, MD. The amount for Reserve for Future Episcopal Transition is unchanged at \$8,000 for 2019.

<u>Collaborative Ministries</u> Bellwether Farm

In 2019, Bellwether Farm will be in full operation, with a few construction items still underway, including the new camp director's house. Like 2018, the largest impact in next year's operating budget will be human resources. The Bellwether Farm staff currently includes a fulltime camp director, a full-time farm manager, and a part-time cook who is helping us in the interim. We expect to hire a part-time chef/ kitchen manager before the start of 2019. That position will be full-time during the camp season and may stay full time, depending upon how many groups and events we can book for the fall and early winter. We also plan to hire a part-time housekeeping staff member to clean buildings and the overnight retreat rooms. We expect to hire another part-time staff member to schedule field trips and overnight programs with local schools. By early next summer, we will hire camp counselors and a nurse for an eight-week camp program.

Other major operating expenses include: utilities; program, landscaping, and farm supplies; food; and kitchen and housekeeping supplies. Because

the buildings are new, we expect repair and maintenance costs to be relatively low this first full year of operations.

Support from the diocesan operating budget for 2019 is allocated at \$125,000 and will cover some of the staff costs. Camp, event and space rental fees will provide additional revenue to support operations. We also expect to work with the Development Office on fundraising activities. The monies for Bellwether Farm are listed under Fund Transfers in the diocesan budget.

The Finance Office and Bellwether Farm staff have not finalized the operations plan for 2019. So, Diocesan Council will approve the budget at its December 2018 meeting.

Office for Mission

The Office for Mission provides resources and linkages "to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ" (Ephesians 4:12).

We administer various grant programs and support the commissions that receive and evaluate them; we assist parishes in the evaluation of their mission strategies; we foster connections between parishes, the wider church, and the communities we serve so that efforts and information are shared across contexts. We are linked to the Episcopal Public Policy Network, Episcopal Relief and Development (including domestic disaster relief), Episcopal Migration Ministries and the Global Episcopal Mission Network. Margaret D'Anieri, the Canon for Mission, also serves as the Jubilee officer.

Commission for Global and Domestic Mission (CGDM)

The Commission for Global and Domestic Mission (CGDM) serves as a resource to parishes in ministry locally, and by developing and supporting international partnerships that enable individuals and parishes to be in relationship with others overseas. Since 2006, Diocesan Council has delegated to CGDM the responsibility for soliciting, reviewing and making recommendations on grant requests for ministry initiatives aimed at fulfilling the 17 United Nations Sustainable Development Goals. The Diocese designates 0.7% of its annual budget toward projects that fulfill one or more of the goals, in accordance with the UN Resolution and the endorsing resolution of General Convention in 2015. Corresponding to the overall decrease in operating income, the amount designated for 2019 will decrease slightly to \$21,886.

The Commission for Global and Domestic Mission is also the focal point for our Diocesan partnerships with Belize and Tanga. The total budget amount for these areas is unchanged at \$16,000; however, for 2019 \$12,000 is allocated to Belize and \$4,000 for Tanga, recognizing that Tanga will have funds remaining from 2018, and that the several streams of mission in Belize continue to flourish. Our relationship with Belize continues to be strengthened by considerable contact and conversation, including Happening Belize, the Belize pilgrimage, a seminarian internship, and the ongoing work of project Science Success. The election of Tanga Bishop Maimbo Mdolwa as Archbishop of Tanga has delayed our work there as he assumes his new duties while continuing as Bishop of Tanga.

Commission for Racial Understanding (CRU)

The Commission for Racial Understanding is working to bring anti-racism training to the Diocese, and to offer and publicize events that educate around issues of racism. Several people represented the Diocese at "A National Conversation" at the Absalom Jones Center for Racial Healing in Atlanta in February, 2018. We are working to offer a provincial conversation in 2019 on "Becoming Beloved Community", the Episcopal Church initiative designed to support a long-term commitment to racial healing, reconciliation and justice.

Support of Episcopal Community Services/

Bishop's Appeal Grants

While the funds are not in our budget, the Office for Mission supports the grant-making work of Episcopal Community Services and our budget covers the administrative costs of that work. This year, we have moved to an online format for grant applications that streamlines the process and allows for more consistent comparisons. We evaluate and administer grants from the Bishop's Annual Appeal for youth mission trips and summer youth education programs. The Office for Mission manages the Summer Internship program, funded through the Bishop's Appeal. We had four interns over the summer, working in Archives, Development, Communications and Mission, and participating in three formation days.

Community of Deacons and Social Advocacy

The Office of Mission has \$1,500 to support continuing education for Deacons, and for the Diocesan membership in the Association of Episcopal Deacons. We also have \$1,000 in funds budgeted for efforts around Social Advocacy.

Administrative and Additional Opportunities

The budget of \$1,500 for administrative expenses has provided modest hospitality at some meetings; books, materials and conference fees. Our budget includes \$5,000 for "Additional Opportunities," a way to provide seed money toward proposals that do not fit within existing categories or timing.

Office of the Bishop and Support Offices Office of the Bishop

This budget amount remains unchanged from the 2018 level.

Each Mission Area Council will continue to have access to \$3,000 from the Diocesan Operating Budget for its unrestricted use (i.e., administrative, event underwriting, educational, and service, etc.). Each Mission Area is also allocated an additional \$1,000 (from the Mission Office section of the Budget) that may be used only for outreach/service projects (domestic

or international). Under Diocesan Council guidelines, Mission Area Councils must request funding based on their actual or planned spending. Mission Area Council funds are replenished only up to the level of the annual funding maximum.

Finance Office

The total of \$44,290 for the Finance Office represents no increase from the 2018 budget.

The budget consists of administrative expenses and financial resource costs of \$4,100, maintenance costs for accounting software of \$14,590, bank fees of \$6,600, archive expenses of \$3,600, payroll preparation costs of \$2,400, and the fee for the Diocesan audit of \$13,000.

The primary focus of the Finance Office is the SERVE component of the mission statement. In this capacity, the primary functions of the Finance Office are as follows:

- Administers the Joint Investment Fund for The Trustees of the Diocese (investments of about \$53 million and 291 Diocesan and parish accounts);
- Administers the health and dental insurance programs for about 80 lay and clergy employees and their families;
- Administers the Capital Loans and Grants program;
- Maintains records of all gifts and grants to the Bishop's Annual Appeal, ECS, and Planting for Tomorrow;
- Provides training for parish treasurers and bookkeepers in accounting and internal controls;
- Coordinates the CPA audits of the Diocese and the Joint Investment Fund;
- Coordinates audits of 85 parishes using the Diocesan audit team, committee and CPA audits;
- Works with parishes in meeting their canonical requirements for reporting in the areas of assessments, insurance, lay pensions, and parochial reports; and
- Provides accounting, payroll, financial

reporting and budgeting for all diocesan operations (Council, Trustees, ECS, the Church Home, Holy Cross and camp and retreat ministry).

Development Office

The development office supports the Bishop and all of the diocesan parishes by leading strategies to increase involvement and engagement across the diocese and to grow resources to support the work of the church. It supports parishes by providing funds for annual stewardship campaigns, grant-seeking, planned giving, capital campaign planning, and leadership development. The office also provides tools for individuals to deepen their understanding and practice of personal stewardship.

The development office raises funds to advance the work of the diocese from individuals, foundations, and other sources. The office helps to link parishes with funding opportunities, including grants available through the Episcopal Church. Annually, it invites every parishioner to give to the Bishop's Annual Appeal, which supports a diversity of programs across the diocese. The office also raises funds to support major initiatives in the diocese, including Bellwether Farm, leadership development, lay and clergy education, outreach activities, and spiritual formation.

Stewardship Education

The development office strives to conduct consistent and regular visits to parishes, to put on mission area and diocese-wide educational programs, and to provide toolkits for parishes to help advance their stewardship, fundraising, and leadership development. Through resources, education, workshops, and training, the development office endeavors to educate all the members of the diocese, including adults, youth, and clergy about the spiritual discipline of giving.

The Bishop's Annual Appeal

The Bishop's Appeal invites members of the Diocese, foundations, and other funders to

support programs and ministries made possible with our shared generosity. Gifts to the appeal from individuals and foundations constitute a vital source of funding for Diocesan ministry and outreach. Annually the Appeal provides resources for:

- Episcopal Community Services (ECS). ECS supports a network of parish-sponsored programs that respond to community needs and opportunities in the areas of health and homelessness, the fight against hunger, youth and education, and other social services. The goal of Episcopal Community Services is to make grants to strengthen communities through citizen involvement and leadership in local programs that combat poverty, illness, nutritional deficit, and low educational achievement while increasing a sense of ownership, leadership, and competence among those who serve and are served.
- Servant Leader Development. The Bishop's
 Appeal raises funds to employ recently
 ordained clergy in our parishes; support
 seminarians and internships for young adults;
 and support college and university ministries
 to form and inspire new generations of
 servant leaders.
- Youth Formation and Mission Experiences.
 The Bishop's Appeal makes possible camp, retreat, convention, and mission experiences for youth across the diocese regardless of parish size or resources.

In 2017, 560 households contributed a record \$300,000 through **The Bishop's Annual Appeal.** \$100,000 was directed to Episcopal Community Services and more than \$100,000 was provided for youth formation, ministry to the newly ordained, and leadership opportunities.

The Bishop's Annual Appeal provides resources for ministries that individual parishes cannot raise on their own. It provides opportunities for youth throughout the diocese to live, learn, worship, and grow together as they mature to become Christian leaders.

Planned Giving

The Development Office is working to provide parishes with the resources, training, and tools to create robust planned giving programs. The office provides training both through group seminars and individually across the diocese.

The office works with a group of volunteers who make up the Diocesan Planned Giving Council. The Planned Giving Council's role is to help parishes implement all aspects of planned giving development and gift management. The Council organizes educational seminars and creates tools and materials to help parishes in the Diocese start or maintain a planned giving program.

It encourages parishes to participate in the Joint Investment Fund (JIF) through the Diocese and it makes available technical expertise in the areas of taxation and estate planning for charitable gift planning. Council members meet with individuals, as well as parish leaders and vestries to inform, educate, and support them in all aspects of planned giving.

The Sterling Newell Society honors those who make a planned gift to the Diocese of Ohio, through a bequest, charitable gift annuity, or outright gift to endowment of \$5,000 or more. To date more than 30 families have informed the Diocese of their gift intentions on behalf of the Sterling Newell Society. The Diocese invites members to consider how their planned gift to the diocese will help engage future generations of clergy, seminarians, laity, and children, and safeguard and nurture our congregations.

Summary

The Budget of the Development Office provides for the development, printing, and distribution of materials for the Bishop's Annual Appeal; stewardship education and development; and planned giving resources and education for all individuals and parishes in the Diocese. The proposed 2019 budget does not increase the 2018

budget.

Office of Communications

The Office of Communications creates and maintains channels for the people and parishes of the Diocese of Ohio to share information with one another and with those in the community. The 2019 budget has a few minor changes from 2018. There is an added expense for hosting the websites that was not budgeted in previous years. Since we are no longer printing the Directory (Clergy Finder is located on website) and we are limiting the number of mailings we do, those budgeted funds have reallocated to support website maintenance and hosting. The rest of the line items remain the same.

In 2018, we worked on a number of projects including, but not limited to:

- The launch of new websites for the Diocese of Ohio and Bellwether Farm. The new websites were built with responsive design to allow the best user experience on phones and tablets as well as desktops. The new design and structure was based on feedback from members of the Diocese. One of our primary goals is to increase ease of navigation for all users.
- We are in the process of building a website based on the trademarked phrase: God Loves You. No Exceptions. The current plan is for the website (noexceptions.org) to feature stories about how individuals experience God's love in their lives. It will also include meditations and reflections about where we see God in current events. Screener questionnaires have been created and a number of individuals have participated in answering questions to create a focus group to help guide how the website can be best utilized. Photos, videos, stories, meditations, and reflections are still being created.
- We have started a partnership with an external vendor to help parishes acquire new, responsive websites at an affordable price. Additionally, a survey was sent to parishes and rectors asking for additional input on ways we can better assist our parishes in this way.

- A Brand Guidelines packet has been developed to help establish standardized color schemes, fonts, etc. for the Diocese of Ohio brand. Many of these pull from our existing crest with some additional tertiary colors for balance. We hope to work on a second edition for next year.
- We continue the work of building our social media pages for the Diocese of Ohio and Bellwether Farm on Facebook, Instagram and Twitter. Some examples include photos of Bishops' visitations, progress at Bellwether, photos of indigenous animals and plants with short feature pieces, and photos pulled from our photo banks that tie into trending hashtags.
- Promotional items for Bellwether Farm continue to be created and sold: t-shirts, ball caps, keychains, fleece vests and jackets, and winter watch caps and beanies, lollipops, pull-up banners, table covers, etc.
- Church Life is designed and mailed out quarterly. This year, we did a redesign on the layout.
- We send out the weekly e-bulletin that features events around the diocese. We have a monthly e-blast titled "Articles & Announcements" that showcases one major announcement or story.
- This office is also responsible for Convention handbooks, journals, and A/V.

Personnel, Travel, Office Equipment and Supplies

Personnel

Expenses for Personnel in 2019 are \$1,388 (.08%) lower than the 2018 budget. Salaries decrease from the 2018 budget, based on the restructuring of Rev. Vincent Black's compensation arrangement with Church of the Ascension. Personnel expenses include provision for possible cost-of-living and/or merit increases for the staff. The Bishop's Appeal funds summer internships for high school and college students. Reimbursements from diocesan trusts administered by diocesan staff fund about 13.6% percent (\$244,551 of the \$1,798,076) of the

personnel budget.

The budget includes funding for Bishop Hollingsworth, 6 full-time program staff positions, 2 half-time program staff, 7 full-time support staff, two part-time assisting bishops, one part-time position in the archives, one part-time position in the Resource Center, and a part-time ecumenical officer.

Salaries and benefits are 50.3% of the Diocesan budget in 2019 and 50.6% in 2018.

The total provides for salary, pension, health and dental insurance, workers' compensation insurance, and long-term disability and life insurance for lay employees approximately equivalent to that provided to clergy. It also provides for training, continuing education, and sabbatical assistance for lay and clergy and continues payment of a supplement that assists retired Diocesan staff in meeting their rising expenses for health insurance costs.

Travel

The 2019 budget for travel expenses represents reimbursement for all business-related travel expenses of the Diocesan staff. The \$74,750 represents no change from the 2018 budget.

Office Equipment and Supplies

Office expenses are \$199,680 for 2019, a decrease of \$15,500 from 2018 that is attributable to a decrease in the Diocesan share of Trinity Commons' expenses, including a provision for contracted information technology support. The reserve for Trinity Commons' capital remains constant at \$5,000 for 2019. There are several minor changes to other line items: insurance expense (-\$500), local phone charges (-\$2,000), and the Internet connection service (\$1,000). Equipment and supplies are \$15,000 in the 2019 budget. This amount is \$300 less than the 2018 amount. The budget includes funding for postage, copies, computer software, supplies and network maintenance; and office supplies and stationery.

Notes to Financial Statements Years Ended December 31, 2018 and 2017

NOTE 1 - ORGANIZATION AND PURPOSE

The Diocese of Ohio (Diocese) qualifies under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3) as exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(a). The Diocese is a not-for-profit organization that provides administrative support and spiritual leadership for the existing parishes and parish organizations subject to the jurisdiction of the Diocese or affiliated with the Protestant Episcopal Church. The Diocese's primary sources of revenue are assessments, contributions, and offerings from parishes and parish organizations.

The financial statements of the Diocese do not include the assets of existing parishes or parish organizations. Existing parishes include active and imperiled parishes, with the exception of certain imperiled parishes which are planned to be or have been restarted, as further described below. Any parish which has been declared extinct by Diocesan Convention ceases to exist, and all assets are transferred to the Diocese or the Trustees of the Diocese of Ohio, a related party (Trustees).

Under the provisions of The Episcopal Church (Church) and Diocesan canons, parishes hold legal title to all property, both real and personal, in trust for the Diocese and the Church. Parishes exercise control of their assets within the provisions of the trust. A parish may not, however, alienate or encumber its real property without the consent of the Standing Committee of the Diocese and the Bishop. All property of the parish is included in its books and records.

As of and for the years ending December 31, 2018 and 2017, these financial statements include certain personal property and financial activity for St. John's Church in Cleveland and St. Barnabas Church in Bay Village. St. John's Church is imperiled at December 31, 2018 and 2017.

Title to the real estate and other personal property of closed parishes is held in trust by the Trustees of the Diocese of Ohio, a related party, pending disposition of the assets and are not included in these financial statements.

In order to assume observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the Diocese, the accounts of the Diocese are accounted for and reported by funds. Within these financial statements, the net assets within each fund are presented as either net assets without donor restrictions or net assets with donor restrictions. Donor restricted net assets may only be utilized for the donor's intended purpose and/or in accordance with the donor's time restrictions. The Diocese retains full control over net assets with donor restrictions for use in achieving any of its organizational purposes. Board designated net assets and reserves represent the portion of net assets without donor restrictions the Diocese has specified for certain purposes.

Notes to Financial Statements Years Ended December 31, 2018 and 2017

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Presentation

The Diocese's financial statement presentation follows the recommendations of the Financial Accounting Standards Board in its accounting standards for Not-for-Profit Entities. Under these standards, the Diocese is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to two classes of net assets: net assets without donor restrictions and with donor restrictions net assets.

Net Assets without Donor Restrictions

This category includes net assets not subject to donor-imposed stipulations. Earnings and unrealized and realized gains and losses on donor restricted net assets are classified as without donor restrictions unless restricted by the donor or by applicable law. This category includes net assets designated for a specific purpose by the Diocesan Council or another governing authority. The governing authority may choose to adjust and/or rescind the designation at a future date.

Net Assets with Donor Restrictions

This category includes net assets where use by the Diocese is limited by donor-imposed restrictions that either expire by the passage of time or can be fulfilled and removed by actions of the Diocese pursuant to the stipulations. In addition, this category includes net assets restricted by donor stipulations neither expiring with the passage of time nor being fulfilled or otherwise be removed by actions of the Diocese.

Changes in Accounting Principles

In 2016, FASB issued Accounting Standards Update (ASU) 2016-14, Not-for-Profit Entities (Topic 958) - Presentation of Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Entities. The update addresses the complexity and understandability of net asset classification, deficiencies in information about liquidity and availability of resources, and the lack of consistency in type of information provided about expenses and investment return. The Diocese has implemented ASU 2016-14 on a retrospective basis except for the disclosures related to liquidity and availability of resources. The retrospective application has the effect of presenting net assets previously reported as unrestricted net assets as net assets without donor restriction and temporarily restricted and permanently restricted net assets as net assets with donor restriction.

Prior Year Summarized Information

The financial statements include certain prior-year summarized comparative information in total on the statement of functional expenses but not by functional classification. Such information does not include sufficient detail to constitute a complete presentation in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Accordingly, such information should be read in conjunction with the Diocese's financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2017, from which the summarized information was derived.

Notes to Financial Statements Years Ended December 31, 2018 and 2017

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Contributions

Contributions of cash and other assets, including unconditional promises to give in the future, are reported as revenue when the promise to give is received, and measured at fair value. Contributions without donor-imposed restrictions and contributions with donor-imposed time or purpose restrictions that are met in the same period as the gift are both reported as support without donor restrictions. Donor promises to give in the future (a period exceeding one year from the date of the statement of financial position) are recorded at the present value of estimated future cash flows. Other restricted gifts are reported as restricted support and net assets with donor restrictions.

Cash Equivalents

The Diocese considers all highly liquid investments available for current use with an original maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents. The Diocese maintains cash and cash equivalents at various financial institutions which may exceed federally insured amounts from time to time.

Marketable Securities

The Diocese records marketable securities at their fair value based on quoted market prices as further described in Note 17. Changes in net unrealized gains and losses from investments represent changes in the different market values and costs, and are included in the statements of activities and changes in net assets. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investments, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of the investments will occur in the near term and that such change could materially affect the amounts reported in the financial statements.

Assessments Receivable

Assessments receivable represent non-interest bearing assessments due from parishes as required under the Diocesan canons. The assessments are based on the Normal Operating Expense of each parish as defined in the annual Parochial Report completed by each parish and are due on a monthly basis. At the discretion of the Bishop, the time for payment may be extended by signing a note. No provision for uncollectible assessments has been made, since it is the opinion of management, in accordance with Diocesan canons, the assessments receivable are collectible in full.

Loans and Notes Receivable

With approval of the Diocesan Council, the Diocese makes unsecured loans from special purpose funds to the parishes as a means of financing construction of new buildings and improvements to existing buildings. Loans and notes receivable are stated at unpaid principal balances. All outstanding loans to parishes bear interest at rates between 4% and 5%. The Diocesan Council, at their discretion, will determine if a loan will be placed on nonaccrual status. While the realization term of these loans may be extended, the Diocese monitors these loans closely and determines loans are past due when payments are no longer being made and no extensions have been granted. There are no loans that are on nonaccrual status.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Property and Equipment

Land, buildings, equipment, and vehicles are recorded at cost. Buildings, equipment, and vehicles are depreciated using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets: buildings, 45 years; building furnishings and equipment, 10 years; office and computer equipment, 3-10 years; vehicles and other, 5-10 years; and the Trinity Commons project, 5-40 years. The Diocese's policy is to capitalize assets greater than \$2,500 in value. Maintenance and repairs are charged to expense when incurred.

Functional Allocation of Expenses

The activities of the Diocese are broken into two major program areas (ministry and Bellwether Farm) and support services. Expenses identified with a specific program or supporting function are recorded directly according to their natural expense classification. Certain expenses relate to more than one function are allocated based on an analysis by the Diocese of employee time spent within each functional area. Although the methods of allocation used are considered appropriate, other methods could be used that would produce a different result.

Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Reclassifications

Certain amounts in the 2017 financial statements have been reclassified to conform to the 2018 financial statement presentation. These reclassifications had no effect on total assets, total liabilities, total net assets, or changes in net assets.

Subsequent Events

Subsequent events were evaluated through September 19, 2019, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

The Diocese has both donor-restricted endowments and funds designated by boards as endowments. Income from these endowments may be restricted or designated for specific purposes, or available for general use. Donor-restricted endowment funds are not available for general expenditure. The boards could re-designate the purposes of Board-designated endowment funds to make additional funds available for general expenditure. Income is generally used in accordance with the purpose established by the donor(s) and/or the designations by the respective board. However, financial assets may be redesignated if needed for other purposes. Financial assets that are restricted by the donors for long-term purposes or not due to be received within one year of the balance sheet date are excluded from the above calculation.

All of the Diocese endowment funds are subject to a spending rate determined annually by The Trustees of the Diocese of Ohio, as further described in Note 16. The rate for the year 2018 was 4.5%.

Amounts in excess of current needs may be invested in the money market funds or other suitable short-term investments. As part of the annual budget process, Diocesan Council may set aside amounts for future events in operating reserves. A portion of an operating surplus may also be designated for operating reserves, or for other programmatic initiatives.

The Diocese participates in the Joint Investment Fund (Fund). The Fund is an investment fund administered by the Trustees for the invested funds of the Diocese, existing parishes, parish organizations, and any not-for-profit organizations subject to the jurisdiction of The Episcopal Church. Assets in the Fund are primarily invested in U.S. government securities, actively traded stocks, and mutual funds. The Diocese records marketable securities at their fair value based on quoted market prices as further described in Note 17.

NOTE 5 - PERPETUAL TRUSTS

The Diocese, The Church Home, The Holy Cross House, and St. John's, Cleveland are irrevocable beneficiaries of several perpetual trusts held by third party trustees from which the Diocese receives trust income annually. The fair value of these beneficial interests totaled \$2,465,699 and \$2,833,551 as of December 31, 2018 and 2017, respectively, which is estimated to approximate the present value of expected future distributions from the trusts. Distributions from perpetual trusts and changes in the fair value are reflected in the statements of activities and changes in net assets.

NOTE 6 - PROMISES TO GIVE

During 2014, the Diocese began its Planting for Tomorrow-Growing in Faith Today campaign to raise funds for a new camp and retreat ministry center and parishes, as more fully described in Note 7. Several pledges also remain from its Legacy Campaign which ended in 2002. At December 31, 2018 and 2017, promises to give resulting from these campaigns have been reported net of a 5.5% discount rate. These discounts will be amortized as revenue and support over the life of these pledges.

NOTE 7 - PLANTING FOR TOMORROW-GROWING IN FAITH TODAY

The Diocese's capital campaign, Planting for Tomorrow-Growing in Faith Today, was conducted between January 1, 2014 and June 30, 2015. The overall campaign goal was \$12 million: \$8 million for the camp and retreat ministry center, and \$4 million for parishes.

Leadership gifts from major donors are reflected in these financial statements as contributions and offerings revenue in the special purpose funds section of the statements of activities and changes in net assets.

NOTE 7 - PLANTING FOR TOMORROW-GROWING IN FAITH TODAY (CONTINUED)

The Diocese acts as the fiscal agent for the parish collaborative campaigns. The parishes' portion of pledges receivable is included in the amounts shown in Note 6. Cash gifts and pledges are also shown as pledges payable in the statements of financial position. The parishes record revenue from the cash and/or pledges when received or accrued based on their respective accounting methods. The Diocese disburses cash (gifts and pledge payments received) to parishes on a quarterly basis. Some donors restricted their gifts to be used for the parish only, and those gifts are not recorded in these financial statements.

Several parishes made gifts to the campaign or conducted in-pew appeals from their parishioners. These gifts, as well as the Diocese's share of cash gifts and pledges from parish collaborative campaigns, are recorded in these financial statements in the same manner as leadership gifts described above. Promises to give payable have been reported net of a discount rate of 5.5% and are payable upon collection of the corresponding pledge contributions. The present value discount on promises to give payable was \$93,511 and \$91,254 as of December 31, 2018 and 2017, respectively.

NOTE 10 - GRANTS PAYABLE

At December 31, 2018 and 2017, the Diocese had committed \$88,435 and \$88,209, respectively, (exclusive of its ownership portion) to support the Trinity Commons project as a result of Legacy campaign pledge contributions. These amounts have been reported net of a discount rate of 5% and are payable upon collection of the corresponding pledge contributions.

At December 31, 2018 and 2017, the Diocese had committed \$33,333 and \$65,441 to support the Trinity Episcopal Cathedral's "From Generation to Generation" capital campaign. These amounts have been reported net of a discount rate of 1.74% and are payable over the next two years.

NOTE 11 - MORTGAGE PAYABLE

In February 2014, St. Barnabas Church in Bay Village purchased a residence to be used as a rectory. St. Barnabas and the Diocese are co-borrowers on the mortgage secured by the property. The loan covenant provides that the Diocese will maintain a debt service coverage ratio.

The mortgage with First Federal of Lakewood bears interest at an annual rate of 4.88%. This rate is fixed over the first 5 years of the mortgage. After the first 5 years, in 2019, the interest rate will be adjusted to the five year Federal Home Loan Bank rate plus 3.00%. Interest and principal payments of \$1,045 are payable monthly, and the mortgage matures on April 1, 2024. At the maturity date, a balloon payment of \$99,046 is due. The mortgage is expected to be refinanced prior to its maturity date. The mortgage is secured by the St. Barnabas building.

NOTE 12 - NOTES PAYABLE

In August 2017 and 2018, a related party loaned the Diocese a total of \$2,000,000 to assist in the purchase of property for \$3,450,000 near Bellwether Farm for the development of future programmatic activities. The property was purchased in September 2018. In July 2018, a related party loaned the Diocese an additional \$2,000,000 to complete the construction of the Bellwether Farm project. All notes are unsecured, non-interest bearing, and due on demand.

NOTE 13 - TRINITY COMMONS PROJECT

The Diocese entered into a joint ownership agreement with Trinity Cathedral (Cathedral) for ownership, operation, and management of a building project known as Trinity Commons. This fulfills a common goal of the Diocese and the Cathedral to develop and operate a religious and community outreach campus. The project was completed and placed in service January 1, 2003.

The Diocese and the Cathedral each have an individual 50% leasehold interest in the property as well as an undivided 50% ownership interest in the improvements comprising the project.

The total project cost, including equipment and furnishing, was approximately \$10,600,000. The source of funds for the construction, equipping, and ongoing operating of the project are charitable gifts and grants as received through the Legacy pledge campaign (Note 6), investment by both the Diocese and Cathedral, bank financing, and operating revenues the project generates, including revenues from third-party rentals.

Project expenses and other required funds for the project or the property are proportioned on a basis of 33.33% to the Diocese and 66.67% to the Cathedral, or as adjusted by the operating agreement in place.

NOTE 16 - ENDOWMENT FUNDS

The endowment funds of the Diocese include board-designated and donor-restricted endowment funds. Net assets associated with endowment funds are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions.

Interpretation of Relevant Law

The Trustees of the Diocese of Ohio have interpreted the Ohio Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (UPMIFA) as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date to the donor-restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. As a result of this interpretation, the Diocese classifies as permanently restricted net assets a) the original value of gifts donated to the permanent endowment, b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the permanent endowment, c) accumulations to the permanent endowment made in accordance with the direction of the applicable donor gift instrument at the time the accumulation is added to the fund.

Notes to Financial Statements Years Ended December 31, 2018 and 2017

NOTE 16 - ENDOWMENT FUNDS (CONTINUED)

Interpretation of Relevant Law (Continued)

The remaining portion of the donor-restricted endowment fund that is not classified in permanently restricted net assets is classified as temporary restricted net assets until those amounts are appropriated for expenditure by the Diocese in a manner consistent with the standard of prudence prescribed by UPMIFA. In accordance with UPMIFA, the Diocese considers the following factors in making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted endowment funds:

- 1) the duration and preservation of the fund
- 2) the purposes of the Diocese and the donor-restricted endowment fund
- 3) general economic conditions
- 4) the possible effect of inflation and deflation
- 5) the expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments
- 6) other resources of the Diocese
- 7) the investment policies of the Diocese

Return Objectives and Risk Parameters

The Trustees of the Diocese of Ohio have adopted investment and spending policies for both donor-restricted and Board-designated special purpose and endowment assets invested in the Fund. These policies, which are enumerated in the Statement of Spending and Investment Policy (Policy), attempt to provide a predictable stream of funding to programs supported by these assets. Under this policy, the endowment and special purpose funds are invested in a manner to achieve the objective of an annual return that is at least 4-6% greater than the rate of inflation as measured by the Consumer Price Index (CPI), while investing with sufficient diversification to minimize the risk of large losses to the fund. Actual return of the Fund may vary from this objective. These policies may be amended from time to time as determined by the Trustees.

Strategies Employed for Achieving Objectives

In order to satisfy its long-term investment objectives, the Trustees rely on a total return orientation that attempts to achieve investment returns through both income and growth. The Policy includes asset allocation guidelines for domestic and international equity, cash and fixed income, and alternative investments. A target allocation percentage as well as tolerance ranges are identified for each asset group. A combination of actively managed accounts and passive investments has been selected to implement the asset allocation. The guidelines have been implemented by the investment managers and reviewed by the Trustees annually, or more frequently if needed. The Policy also describes the benchmark used to measure Fund performance.

The Trustees have also adopted policies for socially responsible investing. These policies prohibit the direct investment in tobacco and gaming companies. The Trustees have hired investment advisers who monitor compliance with the socially responsible investment policies and report their findings to the Trustees.

NOTE 16 - ENDOWMENT FUNDS (CONTINUED)

Spending Policy and How the Investment Objectives Relate to the Policy

As of June 30th of each year, the Trustees determine the average unit value for the Fund for the 12 previous calendar quarters ending on that date. A spending rate is then applied to the average unit value to determine the annual income to participants for the subsequent calendar year. During 2018 and 2017, the Trustees approved a spending rate of 4.5%. This rate is evaluated annually by the Trustees and is subject to change.

The spending policy is consistent with the Diocese's objective to maintain the purchasing power of the endowment assets held in perpetuity or for a specified term as well as to provide additional real growth through new gifts and investment return.

At certain times, donor-restricted endowment funds may have fair values less than the amount required to be maintained by donors or by law (underwater endowments). We have interpreted UPMIFA to permit spending from underwater endowments in accordance with prudent measures required under law. At December 31, 2018, funds with original gift values of \$2,122,974, fair values of \$1,925,288, and deficiencies of \$197,686 were reported in net assets with donor restrictions. As of March 31, 2019, the funds have not yet fully recovered the amount of the deficiencies. As of December 31, 2017, there were no underwater endowments.

NOTE 17 - FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Accounting standards require certain assets and liabilities to be reported at fair value in the financial statements and provide a framework for establishing that fair value. The framework for determining fair value is based on a hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs and valuation techniques used to measure fair value.

In general, fair values determined by Level 1 inputs use quoted prices in active markets for identical assets that the Diocese has the ability to access.

Fair values determined by Level 2 inputs use other inputs that are observable, other than Level 1 prices, such as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets. Joint Investment Fund is valued at the fair market value of its share of the investment pool.

Level 3 inputs are unobservable inputs, including inputs that are available in situations where there is little, if any, market activity for the related asset. Perpetual trusts are valued at the fair market value of the assets contributed to the trusts, which is estimated to approximate the present value of expected distributions from the trusts.

In instances where inputs used to measure fair value fall into different levels in the above fair value hierarchy, fair value measurements in their entirety are categorized based on the lowest level input that is significant to the valuation. The Diocese's assessment of the significance of particular inputs to these fair value measurements requires judgment and considers factors specific to each asset.

The methods described above may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Diocese believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement as of the reporting date.

The following tables present information about the Diocese's assets measured at fair value on a recurring basis at December 31, 2018 and 2017 and the valuation techniques used by the Diocese to determine those fair values.

NOTE 18 - UNCERTAIN INCOME TAX POSITIONS

The Diocese identifies, evaluates, and measures uncertain income tax positions, if any. The Diocese is currently not required to file any federal or state income tax returns and is exempt under the group exemption of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America.

The Diocese has established a system to monitor and evaluate potential income tax positions, which may include, but not limited to, such items as:

- The tax exemption of the Diocese, including its status under the group exemption,
- Unrelated business income, and
- State income tax filing requirements.

At December 31, 2018 and 2017, there are no uncertain income tax positions required to be disclosed.

NOTE 19 - EMPLOYEE BENEFITS PLAN

All clergy of the Diocese are covered by a defined benefit pension plan administered by the Church Pension Fund, requiring contributions at 18% of compensation, which totaled \$103,169 and \$102,682, respectively during the years ended December 31, 2018 and 2017. The pension plan's assets exceeded the actuarially computed present value of accumulated benefits as of March 31, 2019, the date of the last actuarial valuation. In the event of withdrawal from the plan, and under certain circumstances, a contributor to a multiple employer plan may be liable for a portion of any under-funded status. The assumed rate of return used in the valuation was 3.875% for the years ended March 31, 2019 and 2018, respectively. Information as to the actuarial present value of vested and non-vested accumulated plan benefits and the plan's net assets available for benefits attributable to employees of the Diocese is not available since the Church Pension Fund does not compute it for each participating diocese.

All lay employees are covered by a noncontributory defined contribution plan sponsored by the Diocese. Under the plan provisions, the Diocese contributed 9.52% of eligible participants' compensation as defined in the plan document. For years ending December 31, 2018 and 2017, the lay pension expense was \$95,523 and \$86,862, respectively.

NOTE 20 - RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Trustees made contributions to the Diocese from the sale of closed and reverted parish properties. For the years ended December 31, 2018 and 2017, these contributions totaled \$183,552 and \$-0-, respectively. Amounts owed to the Trustees were \$10,833 and \$-0- as of December 31, 2018 and 2017, respectively.

The Diocese has a promises to give due from related parties as further described in Note 6.

The Diocese has notes payable due to related parties as further described in Note 12.

NOTE 21 - STATEMENT OF CASH FLOWS

The Diocese received noncash contributions in the form of stock for the years ended December 31, 2018 and 2017. The contribution was donor restricted for long-term purposes. The Diocese converted the stock to cash and received proceeds of \$36,089 and \$666,870, respectively, for the years ended December 31, 2018 and 2017. The proceeds are reported as cash flows from financing activities in the statements of cash flows.

The Diocese also collected \$7,091 and \$28,856, respectively, from the proceeds of the sale of stock from contributions received with donor restrictions, but not restricted for long-term purposes for the years ended December 31, 2018 and 2017. Cash receipts from these proceeds are reflected as operating cash flows in the statements of cash flows.

NOTE 22 - COMMITMENTS

As of December 31, 2018 and 2017, the Diocese has remaining construction commitments totaling \$214,503 and \$850,994, respectively, for the site work and renovation of the camp and retreat ministry center.

NOTE 23 - CO-BORROWER LOAN

In July 2016, the Diocese signed a promissory note as a co-borrower on behalf of a parish within the Diocese. The initial amount of the loan was \$326,000 and is set to mature in August 2021. The promissory note requires monthly payments of \$6,265 through the date of maturity, plus interest at a fixed interest rate of 5.75%. The parish makes all monthly payments on the loan and has recorded the asset and liability within their financial statements. The balance of the loan was \$185,446 and \$247,993 as of December 31, 2018 and 2017, respectively.

In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

NOTE A - PURPOSE

The Joint Investment Fund of the Trustees of the Diocese of Ohio (the Fund) is an investment fund administered by the Trustees of the Diocese of Ohio for the invested funds of the Diocese of Ohio (Episcopal), existing parishes, Parish organizations, and any not-for-profit organization subject to the jurisdiction of the Episcopal Church. The Fund is not a separate legal entity, but is a subordinated unit of the Episcopal Church.

NOTE B - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Change in Accounting Principle

On August 18, 2016, FASB issued Accounting Standards Update (ASU) 2016-14, Not-for-Profit Entities (Topic 958) - Presentation of Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Entities. The update addresses deficiencies in information about liquidity and availability of resources and the lack of consistency in type of information provided about expenses and investment return. The Organization has implemented ASU 2016-14 and have adjusted the presentation of these financial statements accordingly. The Organization has implemented ASU 2016-14 on a retrospective basis except for the disclosures related to liquidity and availability of resources.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash represents amounts received by the Fund from participants in December and are in transit to either the Balanced Fund or Money Market Fund. These amounts are deposited in a checking account at U.S. Bank upon receipt.

Cash equivalents held in the Balanced Fund consist of amounts held in money market funds awaiting investment. The entire balance of the Money Market Investment Fund is considered cash. Cash equivalents are defined as having an initial maturity of three months or less at the time of purchase. The Balanced Fund and Money Market Investment Fund cash equivalents are maintained in a professionally managed portfolio and therefore, included in investments on both the statements of participant assets and liabilities and the statements of cash flows.

Notes to Financial Statements
Years Ended December 31, 2018 and 2017

NOTE B - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Investments

Investments are stated at fair market value based on quoted market prices. Investments are reported in the statements of participant assets and liabilities at fair value with any realized or unrealized gains and losses reported in the statements of participant activities. Investment income is recognized as revenue in the period it is earned and gains and losses are recognized as changes in participant deposits in the accounting periods in which they occur. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investments, it is at least reasonably possible changes in the values of the investments will occur in the near term and such changes could materially affect the amounts reported in the financial statements.

Income Distribution

Net investment income of the Money Market Fund is distributed monthly to participants based on the earnings of the investments.

Net investment income of the Balanced Fund is distributed at a rate specified for the years 2018 and 2017, calculated as 4.5% of the rolling average of the value of the Fund on June 30th for the previous twelve quarters. Differences between the actual net investment income and the 4.5% are included in the market value change.

Net investment income is defined as interest, dividends, and capital gain distributions less operating expenses.

Operating Expenses

Operating expenses are comprised of investment management and advisory fees charged to the Fund by the custodian, The Diocese of Ohio, and investment advisors.

Concentration of Credit Risk

Financial instruments which potentially subject the Fund to concentrations of credit risk consist principally of temporary cash investments and marketable securities. The Fund places its investments with high credit quality institutions. These cash balances, as reflected in the financial institutions' records, are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. At December 31, 2018 and 2017, the checking account balance exceeds the limit by \$1,018,990 and \$331,238, respectively.

Subsequent Events

Subsequent events have been evaluated through September 10, 2019, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

NOTE D - FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date and establishes a three-level fair value hierarchy that describes the inputs that are used to measure the fair value as follows:

Level 1 - fair values are based on quoted prices in active markets for identical assets and liabilities. The Fund's level 1 assets include all cash, cash equivalents, and investments, except certain alternative investments.

Level 2 - fair values are based on observable inputs that include: quoted market prices for similar assets or liabilities; quoted market prices that are not in an active market; or other inputs that are observable in the market and can be corroborated.

Level 3 - fair values are based on inputs that are unobservable (for example, supported by little or no market activity). The Fund owns no level 3 assets.

In accordance with ASC 820, Fair Value Measurement, the Fund measures the fair value of certain investments using the net asset value per share of the investment.

NOTE D - FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS (CONTINUED)

The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value as of December 31, 2018 and 2017. There have been no changes in the methodologies used as of December 31, 2018 and 2017.

Mutual funds and common stocks are valued at the per share value of shares held by the Organization at year end.

Money market funds are valued at the net asset value of shares held by the Fund at year end. Money market funds seek to maintain a stable \$1 per share net asset value.

The methods described above may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Fund believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement as of the reporting date.

NOTE E - INVESTMENTS IN CERTAIN ENTITIES THAT CALCULATE NET ASSET VALUE

The Fund uses net asset value (NAV) to calculate the fair value of its investment in Alternative Investment Group Institutional, L.P. and Standard Life Investments GARS Offshore Feeder Fund Ltd., and the Black Diamond Arbitrage, Ltd. Fund (the Alternative Investments).

The primary investment objective of the Alternative Investments is to earn attractive rates of return with reduced volatility by investing its assets among a variety of portfolio managers selected for their alternative investment strategies outside of traditional stock and bond investing. The portfolios selected will generally focus on fundamental securities valuation and will include investments in long and short positions, distressed debt, arbitrage and emerging markets. The Alternative Investments also seeks to reduce investment risk by minimizing dependence on the performance of the broad U.S. equity market.

The Black Diamond Arbitrage Fund invests in merger arbitrage deals where a definitive merger agreement is in place, and announced special situation opportunities, such as spin-offs, corporate restructurings, bankruptcies, or major litigations. The investment opportunities can be located anywhere in the world. The Fund seeks its returns through a combination of an absolute return and relative value perspective. Leverage of between 1.5x and 2.0x is used in most deals. Risk is managed through deal sizing and scenario testing.

NOTE F - LIQUIDITY AND AVAILABILITY

The Diocese of Ohio, its parishes, and other Episcopal organizations under the jurisdiction of The Episcopal Church are eligible to invest in the Fund, and the Fund receives all its deposits from these participants. Although participants; funds may come from contributions with donor restrictions and/or may or may not need to be invested in perpetuity, the funds are deposits without donor restrictions. All investment income generated from investments of the Fund are available to meet cash needs for general expenditures. General expenditures of the Fund include administrative expenses, investment advisory and investment management expenses, custodial fees, income distributions to participants, and participations to be repaid. The annual operations of the Fund are defined as activities occurring during the calendar year.

NOTE F - LIQUIDITY AND AVAILABILITY (CONTINUED)

The Fund manages its cash available to meet general expenditures based on these guidelines:

- Maintain sufficient liquid assets to meet monthly distributions of income, participations to be repaid, and investment, administrative, and custodial fees. Participants may withdraw their deposits upon written notice at any time.
- Invest primarily in assets that are liquid or can be liquidated within an operating cycle, and
- Maintain sufficient reserves in a checking account to handle unexpected and/or emergency requests outside the normal monthly distribution cycle.

The finance office staff of the Diocese of Ohio monitors the availability of cash on an ongoing basis. Requests for the liquidation of investments are made to the Fund's investment advisor and approved by the Trustees of the Diocese of Ohio (Trustees) at its regular quarterly meetings. Based on the amount of funds needed, the investment advisors may also submit a recommendation to rebalance the investment portfolio to the Trustees. Approved liquidation requests are communicated to the Fund's custodian bank for the sale or purchase of investments. Transfers of funds to or from the Fund's checking account are also communicated to the custodian bank for processing.

NOTE G - UNCERTAIN INCOME TAX PROVISIONS

The Fund is considered tax exempt under a subordinated unit of the Episcopal Church which has been granted a group exemption under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

The Fund identifies, evaluates, and measures uncertain income tax positions, if any. The Fund is currently not required to file any federal or state income tax returns and there are no audits for any open tax periods.

The Fund has established a system to monitor and evaluate potential income tax positions which may include, are not limited to, such items as:

- The tax exemption of the Fund, including its status under the group exemption,
- Unrelated business income, and
- State income tax filing requirements.

At December 31, 2018 and 2017, there are no uncertain income tax positions that are required to be disclosed.
